At the annual meeting of owners of the Henry Heppner Estate, Incorporated, held on the 24th ult., the following officers were elected: Henry Blackman, of Portland, president; H. Buchholz, of Springfield, Mass., vice-president; Phil Cohn, of Heppner, secretary-treasurer.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Rood and Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Rood went to Hillsboro, Monday, in response to a message stating that Lewis Rood was not expected to live. Lewis Rood is the oldest of the Rood brothers, and is the father of Mrs. T. J. Humphreys, who went to Hillsboro last Friday to be at the bedside of the sick man.

Pendleton will have a big poultry show lasting one full week commencing December 13. The poultry exhibition is now a permanent feature for Pendleton, it having recently been incorporated under the name of the Umatilla-Morrow County Poultry Association. Last year's exhibit was declared to be the most successful "first show" ever held in the Northwest.

A rough estimate of the fire loss upon the National Forests in Montana and northern Idaho, upon which the Forest officers of the U. S. Department of Agriculture have been engaged since the fires were put out, puts the total amount of timber killed or destroyed in this one district at over six billion board feet, while the area burned over is put at over one and a quarter million acres.

The Montana wool clip this season is said to aggregate 35,500,000 pounds, this according to the estimate of W. R. Sheldon, General Agent of the Wisconsin Central Railroad. This is about 5,500,000 pounds less than the clip of 1909, which is largely due to the decrease in the number of sheep—also to the fact that the average fleece was lighter than last year owing to the hard winter.

The Lost Chord.

Ernest J. Sias, lecturer, entertained a small but highly appreciative audience at Roberts Hall last night. His subject was "The Lost Chord," and the speaker won his audience with his forceful delivery and grandiloquent oratory. It is hardly necessary to say that the large number of Heppner people who were not present last night missed a good discourse, and probably the most instructive number of the lyceum course. Mr. Sias personally recommends the four succeeding numbers of the course and it is hoped that these attractions will be given such support as will guarantee the permanent retention of the lyceum course in Heppner.

A few local sheep sales are reported this week, yearling wethers going from \$2.95 to \$3.10 per head.

Martin Anderson, of Cottage Grove, was an incoming passenger yesterday. Mr. Anderson is working in the interest of Nesmith county.

Jesse Moore, one of the oldest, best known and most highly respected pioneer residents of Umatilla county, was found dead in bed at his home on Butter creek Saturday morning. Death had apparently come painlessly while he slept.

The livestock market in Montana is reported unusually brisk at this time. One leading firm there says that they have customers for between 4,000 and 5,000 stock cattle and are unable to obtain them. It is range stuff, both steers and she stock that is wanted. They report having made a number of sheep deals recently and have more pending. They sold one bunch of lambs at \$2.50 a head and a bunch of five-year-old ewes at \$3.50, also bunch of Hampshire yearlings and two-year olds at \$4.00 a head. Range conditions have improved there which has stimulated the trade in stock. —Rural Spirit.
