Oregon Sheep In Fine Condition.

"Oregon sheep were never in a more healthy condition or freer from contagious diseases."

This was the statement made yesterday by Dr. W. H. Lytle of Pendleton who is both state sheep inspector and state veterinarian. According to Dr. Lytle he has had but one case of scabbies reported to him in many months. The one case occurred in Lake county a few weeks ago when a band of 60 bucks was found to be infected with the disease. Prompt attention on the part of the state veterinarian and the owner of the sheep resulted in the stamping out of the disease before it had a chance to spread.

As for foot rot, lip and leg disease, and to the many other diseases that the flocks of the state have been heir to in the past, they seem to have been entirely wiped out. There has not been a single case reported in many months.

It will thus be seen that while Oregon sheep may not enter the winter period with quite as much fat on their ribs as in former seasons that they are going into it with constitutions able to withstand the rigors of a long hard winter. The flock masters are also well prepared in that they in much greater quantities than ever before was put up by the great majority of eastern Oregon sheepmen.—East Oregonian.
