Now for that Boost Club!

The rains of the past ten days have brought cheer to the farmers and stockmen.

The election is over. The time is ripe for every citizen of Morrow county to set aside political beliefs, join the Boost Club and be a consistent booster.

Broken vehicles and lame horses result from bad condition of roads, consequently every farmer should be deeply concerned in the betterment of the highways in the vicinity of his acreage, especially that part which is an avenue over which he must drive to his home town and market place.—Pacific Homestead.

A matter that few, if any, men think of, and one that is seldom given any attention, is that of men grouping on the sidewalks, especially at prominent crossings, causing no little annoyance to passersby, particularly the ladies. This is very noticeable in Heppner, due, undoubtedly, to thoughtlessness on the part of the offenders, hence we offer the suggestion that gatherings for the discussion of politics and all other subjects be confined to assembly halls, or at least see that enough room be left on the walks that a lady will not have to undergo the embarrassment of edging her way through a crowd of men. The city police force might be of some assistance in seeing that thoroughfares are not blocked.

OVERTHROW OF PROHIBITION.

The decisive overthrow of prohibition in Oregon at the recent elections would indicate that the people have not been satisfied with the results obtained under prohibition laws in handling the liquor question.

The lessons of the past for both the prohibitionists and liquor dealers ultimately will result in better conditions.

The liquor dealers must realize that the people and not the dealers are going to handle this question. The liquor question can be handled and the saloon men are showing willingness to let the people dictate.

The first thing to do will be to pass city laws for sane regulation and the next thing will be the strict enforcement of these laws.

When the saloon men themselves join with the authorities in helping to strictly enforce the laws, then there will be no more trouble.

When a man refuses to obey the law, it will not be a hard matter to put him out of business, and the wholesome effect of such action will act as a powerful governor on the traffic.

The liquor dealers have been given another chance to be fair. They must be fair or they will be forced to be.

The Gazette has always been opposed to prohibition for the reason that such laws as were in force were not enforced for the reason that conditions were created that made it impossible to enforce the laws.

EASTERN MAIL-ORDER 'MELON.'

The directors of a big Chicago mail-order house have decided to divide a \$10,000,000 melon among the stockholders. Presumably to cover up the enormous profits as well as they can they have also recommended a stock dividend of 33 1/3 per cent on the common stock amounting to \$30,000,000. Such great dividends, even when distributed by big railroad systems embracing thousands of miles of

tracks and employing thousands of men and indirectly affecting the welfare of hundreds of thousands, even millions of people, never fail to bring forth unfavorable comment from the very class on which the Eastern mail-order business levies its greatest toll.

In producing the \$10,000,000 "melon" which the mail-order millionaires are about to cut, Oregon, Washington and Idaho contributed heavily, along with every other state in the Union, and the contributors incidentally received no benefits, financial or otherwise, from the transaction. There are so many reasons why a consumer living thousands of miles away from Eastern mail-order houses should not send his money to them that it is an economic mystery how they annually wheedle so many millions out of victims scattered from one end of the country to the other. To begin with, quality and quantity considered, every order sent out of the Pacific Northwest to the Eastern mail-order houses could be duplicated here at a saving of from 10 per cent to 25 per cent for the buyer.

In specific cases, which have been reported in the Palouse and in the Big Bend country, the loss to the mail-order patron has run as high as \$40 on a \$100 order. In such circumstances, it is easy to understand how \$30,000,000 dividends can be rolled up in short order. Aside from this actual loss in first cost to the mail-order patron, there is a heavy indirect loss. The Eastern mail-order house pays no taxes in the Pacific Northwest, it employs no labor and loads down the mail carriers on the rural routes with tons of alluring, but misleading literature. The local merchant is a permanent business fixture on whom even mail-order patrons are dependent at times. The extent of his stock and its importance depends on the support he receives.

It is not at all complimentary to the intelligence of a large number of people, that by clever advertising Eastern mail-order houses can sell poor goods in large quantities at higher prices than Pacific Coast merchants can secure in small quantities. The Pacific Northwest, which made liberal contributions to that \$10,000,000 "melon," will not share in the benefits, but numerous local merchants will probably enjoy the blessed privilege of extending credit to many of the contributors who paid cash for their share of the \$10,000,000.—Oregonian.

Sensible Poultry Talk.

Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 8.—That utility measured by the egg and meat production is the real standard for the determination of the value of a hen and not the shape and color of feathers is the proposition upon which Professor James Dryden of the Oregon Agricultural College, in a bulletin which has just gone to press, takes issue with the editors of the American Standard of Perfection and breeders of fancy chickens.

"To encourage the poultry industry," says Professor Dryden, "hundreds of poultry shows are held each year and thousands of dollars are paid on premiums and all the premiums are awarded on the basis of the American Standard of Perfection."

"We think we are encouraging the poultry industry by paying premiums for feathers and other fancy points for shape of body, and farmers go to the shows to purchase their breeding stock. They never suspect that the premiums indicate nothing of the egg laying qualities of the fowl."

"The best poultry keeper in the country is the farmer and the farmer's wife. I have been ashamed many times in my chicken career that we who were 'educating the farmers' were raising sickly, constitutionally weak chickens, and then go on to a farm and see running around the barnyard, without attention or care, thrifty, robust, lively chickens. We are slaves of the dogma of the feather and the Standard and the farmer produces the eggs. I believe that the farm stock, the cross bred stock, or shall I say, the mongrel stock, have better vitality, are more fertile and less preyed upon by diseases and produce more eggs than the average flock of pure breeds."

"The way to develop the poultry industry is to stop advocating pure bred or standard bred fowls for the farmer. He should decide on the type of fowl to breed and forget the name of the breed. Let him decide whether he wants an egg type, a meat type or a general purpose type and then purchase pure bred males and grade up his flock. He should start with cross bred fowls and use pure bred male to bring up the grade. The country wants eggs and poultry and we cannot get these by building on the foundation of feathers or fancy points."

"To discover the egg type we have to use the trap nest or some other means of keeping a record of eggs laid by individual hens. The trap nest is about the best thing we have discovered in the poultry business. We will make slow improvement in breeding without an egg record for each hen in the flock. The objection to the trap nest is that it requires too much labor for the farmer. I believe that the state or experiment station should come to the rescue here by establishing a breeding station where farmers could secure at nominal prices cockerels of good laying pedigree to mate with their flocks. It would not take very long to furnish every farmer with a male bird whose ancestry during two generations has a record of 150 eggs a year."
