## School Notes.

On October 25, I visited the school in District No. 17. Here I found Miss Bertha Gibson, the teacher, and 15 pupils diligently working away. An excellent school spirit prevailed. Many of the pupils drive to school, and an excellent barn has been erected for the horses.

The following day, I visited the school at Pine City. The enrollment of this school is 20. Prof. J. T. Johnson is at the helm. He is very enthusiastic over his work. The pupils are making excellent progress. They are doing some fine work in writing, using the "muscular movement." A first class wood shed has been built. A new bookcase will soon be installed. A box social was held recently, and the proceeds amounting to \$35.85 invested in a new organ. This will be a valuable help. The school grounds have been put in good shape. A new flag floats from the flag-pole in the yard. It is planned to have a taller flag-pole provided soon.

The next school I visited was in District No. 50. Mrs. B. B. Rice is the teacher. The enrollment is 9. I was much pleased with the language work in this school. The teacher seems to be able to secure good language work in connection with geography, history, reading, and even arithmetic. Language is not a bugbear with the pupils.

The library books have been received and are ready for delivery. The clerks or members of the school boards are requested to call for them at the office, when in town, or have some neighbor call for them.
