Heppner needs more alley ways back of the store buildings. Draymen should not be compelled to unload merchandise on the sidewalks. The sidewalks were built to walk upon, not to be used merely as platforms for the accommodation of freight.

Several stretches of sidewalk are in need of repair, and especially the walk on the north side of the building occupied by the Phelps grocery. Whether the owners of the property don't know about the condition of the walk, or do know and don't care, is not known. However, a new walk is badly needed, and if it were done right a good concrete walk would be put in.

W. O. Minor, of Heppner, is one of the state's most useful citizens. He has bred a famous herd of Shorthorn cattle that are the delight of livestock experts. Mr. Minor has sent seven head of his cattle to the International Livestock Exhibition at Chicago, where they will be exhibited and later sold. This is the only exhibit Oregon will make in what is claimed to be the greatest livestock show in the world. What Oregon needs is more Minors rather than more professional men.

The time for a good, live commercial club or improvement club in Heppner is certainly most opportune at the present. One can scarcely turn one way or another without coming face to face with some small, but much needed improvement. Poor sidewalks, old shacks, rubbish, and various other things too numerous to mention. This is not mentioned in a way of knocking, but rather in a spirit to boost. The aim is to call attention to these neglected matters and to urge the getting together of the citizens of the town to provide some means for remedying some of the things mentioned at least. To the average reader this may seem trivial, but nevertheless, the things mentioned when properly carried out, go a long way toward beautifying the town and they are within easy reach of the people to accomplish. Let the town people co-operate in this work and get right in and boost and it will not be long before the beginning of greater and better things will be established.

This movement cannot be accomplished by a few. It must be fostered by every citizen and taxpayer of the town. The trouble has always been in the past that a few public spirited men had to shoulder the responsibility and naturally not being able to handle the work in detail, the cause was lost. Past experience should be sufficient knowledge to work on at the present time, and the result should be good big improvement club, ready to knock the knocker, and put their shoulders to the wheel and boost for a bigger and a better Heppner.
