CENSUS FIGURES GIVEN OUT

Seattle Leads Portland by Over 30,000 in Final Returns.

The census bureau has announced the present population of Portland, Or., to be 207,214, which is a gain of 116,788, or 129.2 per cent since 1900.

The present population of Seattle, Wash., was announced as 237,194, showing an increase of 194 per cent since 1900.

At the same time Director Durand issued statements deplaining that flagrant padding had been attempted in each of the two cities and that careful rechecking and re-enumeration had been necessary to reach results with which he was satisfied.

In 1900, Portland was larger than Seattle, the population of the two cities at that census having been: Portland, 90,426; Seattle, 80,671.

Durand charged that the original Seattle enumeration this year was padded to the extent of 11,188 names, which were stricken off. He alleges that Portland was originally padded by 15,745 names, which were eliminated.

Director Durand declared that the Portland enumeration was

padded through the efforts of private organizations, which had caused slips to be printed containing the census questions, filled them in with the names of alleged persons claiming not to have been counted, and turned them over to the enumerators. Wherever the enumerators conscientiously carried out their work, Durand said, few irregularities appeared, but he declared that many enumerators simply added the padded slips given to them to their statements.

A Serious Accident.

Owing to the fact that medical assistance could not be procured immediately, the unfortunate lad suffered a severe loss of blood. HEPPNER HIGH VICTORIOUS

Lads From Local High School Wallop Ione's Hopefuls—10 to 0.

On Thanksgiving day, Nov. 24, 1910, the high school eleven of Heppner and Ione met on the latter's gridiron for the first football game between these two old rivals since 1904. It was an ideal day for the game—crisp, clear and invigorating. The ground had not yet frozen, and there was no snow at all. So it is no wonder the twenty-two young canvas-clad warriors felt some of the gladiatorial blood of the ancient warriors go coursing through their veins as they faced each other in the rough and tumble contest. It was a straight, clean game from start to finish. Referee Roberts of Heppner and Umpire Kauffman of Ione, gave entire satisfaction, their decisions showing that they had mastered the details of the new rules.

A large bunch of Heppner High school students went down to root for their team and give it encouragement throughout the game. Some enterprising students of the Heppner High stretched yards and yards of our colors—oh, you pur-

ple and gold—along the side lines and our rooters took their position by them as there was no grand stand.

Heppner High's eleven was on the field early, but it was not until 1:55 that Ione came trotting onto the field, led by their coach, Kauffman. The two teams began at once to make ready for the coming contest. The captains and officials discussed the various things that must be settled before a game can be played. Among other things it was decided that the quarters should be ten minutes each.

The first quarter was Heppner's, Jones going over the line for a touchdown in the last minute of play. Aiken, Yeager and Jones were the yardage makers in this quarter. Ione's failure to work the forward pass cost them many yards.

In the second quarter, Aiken kicked off. Ione was forced to punt and the ball was booted to within two yards of Heppner's goal. Aiken ran the ball in twenty yards; Crawford and Young worked a criss-cross play for pretty gain; the quarter ended with the ball in Heppner's possession near Ione's goal.

Third quarter no score. Fourth quarter Heppner again scored. Total score 10 to 0.
