Talented Entertainer.

Bess Gearhart Morrison, reader and entertainer, pleased a fair sized audience at Roberts' hall, Tuesday evening. Every number showed plainly the exceptional ability of the performer, and each reading was received with hearty applause.

The program for the most part consisted of reading current stories and poems taken from the popular magazines. Some numbers were familiar to the listeners. Her rendition of James Whitcomb Riley's "Waitin' For the Cat to Die," was especially pleasing.

This was quite a long story, and the reader displayed remarkable versatility in handling the different characters. This was the second number of the lyceum course. So far, the course has proven to be the very best talent. The next number will be a male quartet, and the date is December 26. This should be better patronized than the two previous numbers, not because the real merits of the entertainment are superior, but because the program will offer a larger variety of entertainment. Those who have attended the previous numbers are highly pleased with the course and feel that a much larger attendance was merited.

West Leads by 6102.

Oswald West's plurality in the recent election, as determined by the official count now in progress, is 6102.

The total number of votes cast for governor was 117,690. Jay Bowerman, Republican nominee, received 48,751; Oswald West, Democrat, 54,853; W S Richards, Socialist, 8058; A E Eaton, Prohibitionist, 6027.

In the second congressional district, A W Lafferty's plurality was 11,165. The vote was as follows: Lafferty, Republican, 30,642; John Manning, Democrat, 19,477; W A Crawford, Socialist, 5583; George B Pratt, Prohibitionist, 3524.

The count is still in progress.
