More of His Kind Needed.

Olin S. Hodsdon, the pioneer of Alpine, was a pleasant caller at this office last Friday. Mr. Hodsdon has just finished hauling his crop to the railroad, and is pretty well satisfied with the outcome. He is one of the men that has succeeded as a farmer, and his land does not lay in what is considered the best farming section of the county. What is needed out his way is more men of his kind that will diligently farm the adjacent lands. For two or three seasons past the squirrels have done much damage to the crops in the north end of the county, and it has been impossible to exterminate them. This has made it extremely uphill business for the few farmers in that section to bring their crops to a successful harvest, to say nothing of the drouth they had to contend with. Mr. Hodsdon has witnessed the settling up of his part of his part of the country by two different lots of farmers since his location there; these have tried to farm after a fashion, "scratching in" the grain and expecting mother earth to do the rest and yield them abundant harvests, and when failure which was inevitable, hits them a few hard "biffs," they pulled up and left for pastures green. It has been an unfortunate thing for the county, and it may take a number of years yet to get the right class of people in there. But here and there over that part of the county are men like Mr. Hodsdon who have stayed on the job, farmed the land just as well as they could under all circumstances, managed closely and are now on top. They own their land and have it paid for, and some of them are drawing interest on money loaned. What these few have done, others can do by the same patient and persistent toil. It should be our aim to interest this class of settlers and get them located on these unsettled lands to the north of Lexington and Ione.

School Board Convention.

The annual school board convention was held at the Court House last Thursday evening. Twenty-eight persons were present, and thirteen districts were represented.

Sanitary conditions, school equipment, improvement in premises, consolidation of schools, good roads, relation of the schools to the "Boost" club movement, and the tax levy were among the topics discussed. Some of the topics brought fourth a lively discussion. In fact, the entire session was full of interest. Supt. Notson discussed at some length the matter of the water supply for schools, and urged the boards to provide a filter for the water. A good, practical filter can be purchased for a few dollars. In Polk County, a large majority of the schools are provided with filters and the pupils have individual drinking cups.

Prof. Hoffman discussed the importance of giving attention to the sanitary conditions of the school. He said that the health of the pupils is the first thing to be considered.

Altogether, the meeting was a decided success, but it would have been of much more value if every district had been represented.
