School Notes.

On Dec. 15, I visited the Juniper Canyon school. Mr. A. Onzo Tyler teaches this school. Eight pupils were present, and all are making excellent progress with muscular movement in writing. Since my former visit, five new maps, a new flag and flag pole, some new window shades, and a new coal-bin have been provided. One of the members of the board was present, and he stated that he thought they would provide some new blackboard soon.

I visited over night at the home of Mr. James Carty. The next morning I drove over to the school at Ella, following the old Emigrant Road much of the way. As I drove along I tried to picture the long trains of covered wagons in which the pioneers traveled over this road. I was reminded of some of the hardships which they endured by the little graveyard near Wells Springs. My mind also went forward into the future, and I could picture this part of country covered with homes, as it will be some day. The soil is there; the climate is favorable; and in some way more water will be obtained. Then, with some irrigation and methods of conserving the moisture which comes from the clouds, this country will be made to produce grain and fruits. Man must and will conquer the desert.

At Ella I found Miss Josephine Adams and seven pupils at work. The pupils seemed to be enthusiastic in their work. I noted some good work in phonics. The pupils read with good expression, indicating that they were getting the thought from the printed page. I also noted some good map work which the pupils had done. Window boards will soon be placed in all the windows, thus providing for ventilation.

After leaving the Ella school, I drove over to Mr. Phil Doherty's home, where I had the pleasure of taking dinner with the teacher, the clerk, one director, and nearly all the pupils of the school. Mrs. M. E. Clark teaches in this district. I was pleased to see the flag displayed when I came near the school building. Window boards, good shades, and neat curtains are provided for each window. The light is admitted from the rear and only one side, which is the best arrangement. The work was moving along smoothly, the pupils are making good progress.
