MORROW COUNTY TO THE FRONT

No Need of Going Elsewhere to Get Into the Apple Business.

As evidence of what can be done in raising fine apples in Morrow county, we call attention to the display of several varieties of this fruit at the store of A. M. Phelps. These apples were raised by Mr. Frank Nash, near Ione, and would be hard to excel in any country, Hood River not excepted. Many of our farmers are beginning to take more interest in horticulture, and while no attempt is being made as yet to put out commercial orchards, they are beginning to look to this and are putting out those varieties of apples and pears that have proven to be the best for marketing and winter keeping. It is the opinion of this paper that much land is adapted to fruit raising in Morrow county, and that there is no necessity whatever for sending on the outside for fruit when just as good quality can be produced at home. This county can't be beat for the excellence of its fruit in flavor and appearance, the thing necessary to be done is to set out the varieties that are adapted to this section, keep the trees and orchards in healthy condition, raise clean fruit and bring it to market in good shape and an industry will soon be built up that will mean an income of thousands of dollars annually to our farmers.

J. H. Frad is another of our farmers that now has an orchard of four year old trees that is coming into bearing, and he raised some very excellent apples this season, many of his trees being heavily laden with splendid fruit. It is his opinion that good orchards can be grown on the farms here, and he is making a practical demonstration of the fact. He has been careful in the selection of trees and varieties that he has planted out, and they are coming along all right, being in a healthy, hardy condition, and promising him a nice income for the future.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Much Time Taken Up In Routine Business.

The County Court met in regular session at the court house, Wednesday, January 4. Judge C. C. Patterson, Commissioners Devin and Young, and Clerk W. O. Hill comprised the board.

Bonds of the following officers were read and approved:

J. C. Hayes, sheriff; W. O. Hill, clerk; Frank Gilliam, treasurer; J. J. Wells, assessor; D. V. S. Reid, surveyor; C. C. Chick, coronor; J. P. Williams, justice of the peace for district 6; B. F. Devore, district 1, and J. M. White, Lexington.

Dr. N. E. Winnard was appointed county physician for the year 1911, and his salary fixed at \$400.

Harry Cummings is made fruit inspector for the county and is to be paid \$3 per day for the time actually employed in pursuit of his duties.

C. E. Jones is appointed county road viewer.

Road supervisors appointed: District No. 1, M. C. Smith; 2, I. C. Cox; 3, W. H. Clark; 4, J. L. Kirk; 5, John Ridgeway; 6, R. Hogeland; 7, J. E. Mvagrave; 8, John Fraser; 9, W. E. Pointer; 10, M. R. Morgan; 11, Peter Sasbauer; 12, J. T. Ayers. D. V. S. Reid, county surveyor, was ordered to revise the road records and re-plat all the roads of the county, to make the records of the roads of the county complete.

240 names of the taxpayers were placed in the jury box from which the jurors will be drawn the coming year.

Sheriff Hayes has made the appointment of the following deputies, and approved by the court: Sylvanus Wright for Hardman; Dan Barlow, for Eight Mile and M. F. Parker for Lexington.

The court is now engaged in checking up the financial reports of the officers for the year. This may keep them busy for a couple of weeks.

PASSING OF HONORED PIONEER

Eli Summer, one of the Earliest Settlers on Willow Creek

Mention was made in our last week's issue of the severe illness of Eli Summer, one of the pioneer residents of Morrow county, and his passing was looked for almost any moment. The call came to him at his home below Lexington on last Saturday morning, Jan. 7. The remains were interred in Lexington cemetery, Sunday, the services being conducted by Rev. Bradstreet, of Ione. A very large number of his neighbors and friends followed the remains to their last resting place.

Eli Summer was a native of Ohio, being born in that state on Sept. 20, 1820. On reaching manhood, he moved to Wisconsin where he worked in the pineries until the spring of 1852. With many others he caught the California fever, and crossed the plains by ox team, in due time reaching his destination. He did not remain in California long, however, for in the year 1853 he came to Oregon, settling in the Willamette valley, where he remained until 1871, when he came to this county and settled on Willow creek about a mile and a half below Lexington, residing there ever since.

He was united in marriage to Mrs. Rhoda King Phillips, Nov. 19, 1858, and to this union were born six children, three of whom survive him. These are Philo, Dan of Lexington, and Otto, of Seattle. Besides these sons, he is survived by the widow.

Eli Summer was an Indian war veteran and fought in the wars of 1855-56, furnishing his own horse and equipment as did many of his comrades, and during this service he endured privations for which he never received a penny. He was a man of sterling worth and character, a typical frontiersman and a citizen beyond reproach. Peace to his ashes.

Need Mail Service.
