SOME GOOD DEALS IN DIRT Two Important Deals in Morrow County Soil This Week.

This week has recorded some real estate transfers, and the first of note is that of Chas. Stanton. He has purchased the E. B. Stanton farm of 540 acres in the Eight Mile country, the records showing a consideration of \$10,000. This is his father's old home place, and Charles has been running it for several years. A few weeks ago, Mr. Stanton took a trip to Walla Walla, with a view to buying a small place, but found land priced too high there, and furthermore, he could not figure where a man was to make as good returns on his investment as he could right here, so he has returned content to settle down to business at the old stand. Morrow county dirt is not so bad after all, and there is no better judge of this than friend Charles.

Another deal of importance just closed is the purchase by Alex Lindsay of the Allyn ranch just below Jordan siding, of R. F. Hynd & Co. This is undoubtedly one of the very best alfalfa and fruit ranches on the creek and Mr. Lindsay knows how to handle it. While he makes no pretense at understanding the fruit business, he knows how to get results from alfalfa growing, and as he now has a ranch that has proven to be one of the best in the county as a fruit producer, he will doubtless post himself in fruit raising and bring results worth while in this line also. During the past few years Mr. Lindsay has travelled over much country and has visited many different localities, but is thoroughly convinced that there are no opportunities elsewhere that beat Morrow county and he has determined to locate here permanently. The future of the county and its possibilities cannot be measured at this time, and when capital can be induced to give us an electric line or two, Alex thinks our people have just as good a country as anyone could wish for. He is right.

FARMERS' UNION HOLDS SESSION State Organizer Addressed Gathering of Farmers Yesterday Afternoon

The Farmers' Educational and Co-operative Union held a very interesting meeting at the court house at 2 p. m. yesterday, which was quite well attended. Many farmers living near the city were present. The principal feature of the meeting was a very interesting and instructive address by H. D. G. Cox, of Walla Walla, state organizer for Oregon. He gave a brief sketch of the origin and progress of the movement, from its incipency to the present, and especially what has been accomplished through its efforts for the farmers of the Northwest. Some of the changes wrought for the benefit of the farmers are the price of wheat sacks, reduced from 11 cents to 7 cents; a freight reduction of 30 per cent. on wheat from Walla Walla to Portland, and the privilege of erecting warehouses on the lines of the railroads. By co-operation, the fruit and vegetable producers have received great benefits in the handling of their produce.

Mr. Cox is an interesting talker, literally loaded with facts and figures that appeal to his auditors with telling effect. The Union is doing a great work for the country and should have the hearty, enthusiastic support of every farmer in the country, and every man who has the welfare and prosperity of the country at heart.
