School Notes.

On the 12th inst., I visited the school in District No. 36. This school is under the direction of Miss Winnie Jackson. The enrollment is 21, but a majority of the pupils were absent on account of sickness. The pupils present were doing good work. I noted some excellent work in reading and rapid calculation. This school has a nice collection of pictures of birds and animals in natural colors.

The next school I visited is in District No. 21. The teacher is Miss Maggie Sperry. The most of the pupils were taking the term examination. The enrollment is 15. This school has one of the finest flags in the county. In the evening, a local educational meeting was held at the schoolhouse. Although no notice had been given until the close of the school in the evening, the house was well filled with an attentive audience, showing that the neighborhood is interested in the school.

The Fairview school was the next in my line of march. Here I found Miss Florence Piggott and a few pupils at work. Many of the pupils were absent on account of sickness. So many being absent, the work was somewhat irregular. Since my former visit, a new coal house has been built, and several new desks, a teacher's desk, an organ, and two new flags have been purchased. A flag pole has been erected on the front of the building. This school has an excellent collection of books in its library.

The teachers' examination will be held February 8-11. Regular notice of examination will be published next week.
