WORK FOR IT.

It has been more than twenty-two years since the branch railroad was built to Heppner, and during that time our people have suffered the inconvenience of the long walk or ride to the depot, and it seems that the time has now arrived, if it is ever to come, when we should all join hands and pull for the location of a passenger depot up town. Since the flood came and destroyed a considerable portion of residence property on Chase street along Willow creek, and this has never been rebuilt, it leaves ample room on that street below May street for a suitable depot and the necessary trackage, and as the railroad has the right of way up that far, and on through town for that matter, there is nothing in the way of securing sufficient grounds at the point mentioned. This would make an ideal location.

This matter was taken up by a number of our citizens on Monday night and discussed with the railroad officials who were here, but as these men were not the ones having such business in charge, they could make no promises. But this has been a starter and the time has now come to get together on this proposition and to work for it in earnest. In dealing with the railroad people we must remember that we can get nothing unless we go after it. They are perfectly willing to let matters rest just as they are so long as our people will submit and travel a mile out of town to reach the train, but we believe that if a strong pull is made conditions can be improved and we can have a depot up town that will be convenient and easy of access.

Those who have already taken up this matter and started this agitation are to be commended, and every while a wakeful citizen in Heppner should join in and help the move along. Concerted action will bring what we want in this direction as well as along other lines.

Let our Boost Club get back of it and it will come.

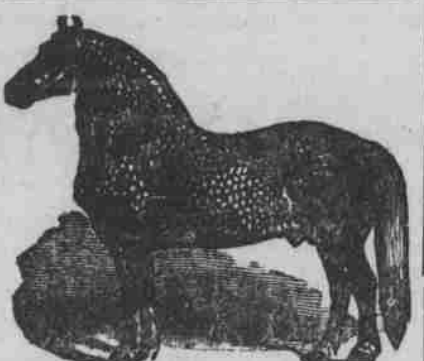

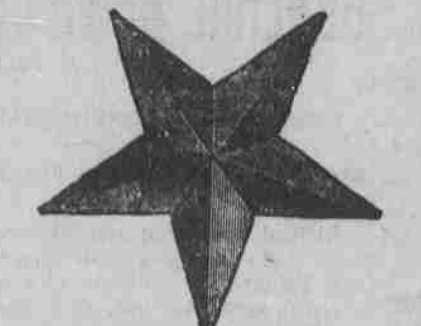
