TO BE HISTORY

MAKING EVENTS

Portland and Astoria Offer Great Attractions This Summer.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 12.—A brilliant historical street pageantry developing the growth and progress of Northwestern civilization since the empire was first discovered, is the unique and novel feature which the thousands of school children of the city will add to the programme of the Portland Rose Festival to be held here the week of June 5-10. This public street procession will supplement another strikingly elaborate spectacle, also of historical purport, which will take place on the new Multnomah Club Field.

These two events will be novelties which will be a part of the continuous programme for the six days in which there will be parades, decorative for the daytime and illuminated for the night. All told six such street pageants will be given in what is by all means the most important and heaviest week of pastime, amusement, entertainment and education ever held in the Pacific Northwest if not in the West.

No like celebration has been favored by the railroads with such generous rates and combination of selling dates. This applies both to through transcontinental fares and rates from points in the Northwest.

The Rose Festival visitor will have the opportunity to any number of side trips, and in fact many inquiries have been received at Festival headquarters from all parts of the country indicating that a goodly number of Easterners expect to see all they can of the matchless scenic beauties of this territory as well as to look for desirable investments.

Even New Englanders and people from the South are making such inquiries. Of especial importance will be the Festival rates this year because with a 90-day return limit, the Easterners will be able to spend that time on the Coast, seeing the Rose Festival in Portland in June and the Astoria Centennial celebration in August.

Never before have the communities of Oregon had such an opportunity for getting the Eastern friends, business men and investors interested in local enterprises, for two such attractions as the Rose Festival and the Astoria celebration are bound to induce thousands of strangers to come here that would not otherwise do so.
