OREGON DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE OFFICIAL WILL VISIT HEPPNER.



Portland, Ore., April 20.—(Special)—James J. Sayer, field secretary of the Oregon Development League, will be in Heppner Friday, April 21. He is now on a tour of Eastern and Central Oregon that will occupy about six weeks, during which he will visit the commercial bodies in the various cities and will do what he can to help them in their work.

Although he is not an orator, Mr. Sayer is thoroughly informed on the work of the Oregon Development League and his visit should be a great benefit to each commercial organization in the district to be covered.

Mr. Sayer will collect information in the different sections, as well as give advice. He wants to become better informed on the different districts of the state he has not yet visited personally. In order to be of greater service to these communities, his present trip he will see much that is new to him and will add largely to his store of knowledge about Oregon.

Some commercial clubs of the interior need reviving, the membership having allowed the organization to languish, and these will be given attention by Mr. Sayer. He will attempt to arouse enthusiasm and give the clubs a new start wherever possible. Meet Mr. Sayer in Heppner tomorrow evening.

Ben W. Oleott has been appointed Secretary of State to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Frank W. Benson. Mr. Oleott is a republican, so called, was manager of Governor West's campaign, and a very close friend of the governor. Of course there was no politics played in this appointment, so apologists for the governor state, but to a fellow away up here in Eastern Oregon it has the appearance of political pay-off. However, Mr. Oleott is said to be a man of splendid qualifications and worthy to fill the position, so the great rank and file of the people of the state care little whether politics had to do with the appointment or not.

Civil service is a great thing. The recent census is an illustration. A fellow at our elbow was saying that if he had taken the contract to enumerate the people of this county and gather up the other data called for by the superintendent of the census, he would have been about the last ones he would have looked for, with perhaps one or two exceptions. Yet they passed the civil service examination and answered the questions and got onto the job, and we see the result. We presume what is true here happened at almost all other places, judging from the almost universal howl that has gone up. Many of the towns and smaller cities have made accounts, calling on their business men to do the work, and in almost every instance it has been shown that the census enumerators were a way off and failed to get the people counted. But all these things must be carried on by the government under civil service rules. Uncle Sam is a great business man.

In the death of Frank W. Benson, Secretary of State, the state of Oregon is deprived of the services of a faithful and conscientious official. He was a modest man, capable, and faithful to his duty. His long fight to regain his health and his cheerful and optimistic views as to the ultimate success of his treatment, won for him great esteem. His re-election to this important office by an overwhelming majority at the last election, in face of the fact that the people felt that he could not serve out his term, shows the standing he had with the people of the state at large. He was a man of character, and because of his character he impressed himself upon the people as a man to be entrusted with the care of important affairs of State. The impress that such a man leaves is not erased by death—it remains as time goes on.

Our old friend, Chas. Read, of the Ione section, is getting into the chicken business in good shape. He now has some 600 young chickens in his brooders, and more to follow. He is raising some of the best chickens and turkeys in the country, and is doing his part toward keeping the market supplied with poultry and fresh eggs.
