FACE GRAND JURY.

It is not often that the County
court is called to account for its ac-
tions by a grand jury, but this hap-
pened to our judge and commissioners
on Friday and Saturday. They were
before the inquisitive body for the
greater part of these two days in
discussion of matters pertaining to
expenditures of one kind and another,
but principally items of road expense.
While our present court may be en-
titled to some criticism in these mat-
ters, yet it should be remembered by
all our citizens that large demands
are placed on the shoulders of the
court in regard to carrying on road
work and the various other legiti-
mate expenses of the county, and
criticisms should always be tempered
with justice and good judgment.

The demand for good roads comes
from all over the county, and it has
been the desire of the court to meet
these calls as far as possible, and we
believe in the best way that they can
devise, to successfully carry on the
work and accomplish the most good
for the money expended. True much
has been done in an experimental
way in the effort to work out the
best plans, but we do not believe the

court has been reckless or blind as to
its proper duties or limits in the work
undertaken.

It is one thing to be a member of
the court and try to conduct the
business of the county as it should
be done, and quite another to occupy
the place of the private citizen and
direct affairs of public interest. We
believe that our present court is
ready and willing at all times to
accept suggestions from any citizen
and taxpayer and to act upon all
good advice, yet they have the ac-
tual work of doing the business and
have to use their own good judg-
ment. Give them a fair deal and
stand back of all good move-
ments for the betterment of our
roads, remembering always that
it will take money, and lots of it, as
well as time to get over all parts of
this big county and deal out to each
section all that is coming to it.
