County Court Proceedings

County court met in regular session at the court house in Heppner, Wednesday, May 3rd, with Judge C. C. Patterson and Commissioners M. J. Devin and J. S. Young in attendance.

Bids were opened in the matter of the construction of a steel bridge across Rhea creek at the Nunamaker place. After due consideration, the original plans were discarded and bids asked for a structure of heavier material. Bids were presented by the Atlas Bridge Company, of Portland, \$1095 for steel work and \$16.50 per cubic yard for concrete work; Minneapolis Steel & Machinery Co., \$1243 and \$17.50; Columbia Bridge Co., of Portland, \$1200 and \$14.00; Security Bridge Co., of Minneapolis, \$1265 and \$16.50.

Two wheel scrapers were purchased, one from the Chas. F. Beck Co., and the other from J. S. Beal & Co., both Portland firms.

A petition of George Perry and 16 others, praying for the establishment of a county road in Rood canyon, was presented, viewers and surveyor to meet at beginning of said road on Tuesday, May 9, 1911, and make report at next regular term of court.

The appointment of G. A. Bleakman as deputy Sheriff at Hardman, is accepted by the court.

Report of viewers and surveyor on petition of John Allen, et al, is accepted and the road ordered opened. This is known as the Rock creek road.
