

OUR VETERANS REMEMBERED.

Both Heppner and Ione
Hold Appropriate
Services.

Decoration day was celebrated in Heppner with appropriate ceremonies at Masonic Cemetery. Weather conditions were perfect and citizens generally united to make the day one of the most impressive occasions of the season.

The ceremonies were under the direction of Rawlins Post and conducted according to the ritual of the G. A. R.

The procession formed in front of Minor & Co's. store at 1:30 p. m. preceded by the Post and the Odd Fellows Lodge in full regalia, and marched to the cemetery where the following program was rendered:

given by Master Kenneth Bionis in a manner that called forth very hearty congratulations from the audience.

Reading Lincoln's Gettysburg Address—by Rev. C. H. Davis.

This was followed by a fervent and eloquent address by Prof. S. E. Notson, in which he paid a glowing tribute to the country's defenders, living and dead, who thought their lives none too dear a sacrifice to be laid on the altar of their Country in its hour of most immediate peril. But the speaker deplored the necessity of war and the appeal to arms for the arbitrament of National and International misunderstandings and difficulties, and closed with expressing hope that the time is not far distant when all civilized nations will look upon war as one of the barbarous customs of an effete past.

Mr. Notson was followed by Rev. Walter L. Airheart in a brief address which closed with the rendition of "The Blue and the Gray," given in a manner that touched all hearts.

The services closed with prayer by Rev. M. R. Thompson and benediction by Rev. J. V. Crawford. The graves of the old soldiers were suitably decorated with flowers by twelve little boys and girls.

Decoration Day was also very fittingly observed by the veterans and their friends at Ione. In the morning graves of old soldiers buried in Ione cemetery were visited and decorated under the direction of the G. A. R. There is no post at Ione, but several members of the order reside in that vicinity, and it was conceived by D. C. Ely that it would be proper to carry out a suitable memorial day service, so he took the matter in hand and with the assistance of the citizens of Ione, a suitable program was arranged and carried out to the letter. It is a regrettable fact, however, that Mr. Ely was so indisposed that he was unable to attend the ceremonies, for he takes great interest in all such things, and it was a sore disappointment to him and his many friends that he could not be present.

At about half past ten the crowd was summoned to the Stratton grove by the playing of the band, and after gathering there the following program was offered:

The program was carried out in a splendid manner and was well received. The part taken by the children and young people is worthy of much praise; in fact it was just good from beginning to end. No attempt was made to do elaborate or extravagant things, but it all went with a natural ease and grace that was refreshing.

The address of Prof. Kaufman, while largely extemporaneous, was nevertheless well delivered and full of meat from beginning to end. He once stated in Heppner that it seemed to be hard for people to take him seriously, but a whose fortune it was to hear him on Tuesday were fully convinced that he could be serious and that he is well able to handle subjects of great weight and with the power of the polished orator. He drew a great lesson for the present age from the history and events of the great civil strife; paid homage to the patriotism and valor of the defenders of the flag during all the struggles through which the country has passed, not failing to call attention in strong terms to some of the perils which the country is facing at the present time. This generation has its questions to settle, and while he is strongly in favor of peaceable settlement, and prays for peace, yet he would cultivate that spirit of patriotism and valor of the sixties that caused men to forget all and offer up their lives to maintain the unity and integrity of the nation, that these questions may be met and settled to the betterment of the citizenship of the nation and that its true institutions may be perpetuated. Big Business is getting some jolts at the present time, and the speaker argues that this work may continue and that the interests that seem now to be pampered and fostered by favorable legislation may be brought to the same level of doing business that the ordinary citizen has to pursue. Other lines of that were also touched upon and each part of his subject was handled in a manner that shows Prof. Kaufman to be a well-informed man on all the questions of the day as well as a student of history. His address was well received and fully merited the many expressions of praise.

Immediately following the address of Prof. Kaufman, all were invited to partake of a splendid picnic dinner prepared by the ladies of Ione and the visitors, which was spread on tables in the grove. The dinner was simply elegant

and no words of praise from this paper can do it justice. Suffice to say, however, the editor of this paper was there, and if you think he did not do the dinner justice while he had his feet under the table, just ask Joe Waters and Dr. Chick. The latter stood ready for at least half an hour to offer his professional services, but fortunately they were not required. But all joking aside, it was a revelation to some of those people down there where such a small man was storing away so much of those goodies and yet there should be no mystery, when it is understood that the editor had to prepare on such occasions and lay by in store for the days of fasting that follow. My, if we could have a feed like that every day.

In the afternoon a game of base ball was played between the Eight Mile and Ione teams, which resulted in a victory for Eight Mile, the score standing 6 to 4. Sorry that we had to leave before this game over, but time and trains wait for no one, so we had to disappear shortly after the second inning, and did not get to witness what was proving to be an interesting contest.

In the evening an open air concert was given by the Ione band at the stand in the grove, and the day ended thus in an enjoyable manner.

There were some eight or ten old veterans in attendance at the exercises, and Prof. Kaufman called attention to a little incident which disclosed a rather remarkable war record in the history of a family that was represented on the grounds in the person of Mrs. Morris, mother of Mrs. Engle, of Ione. Mrs. Morris is visiting with her daughter at this time. Her grandfather fought in the war of the Revolution, her father was a soldier in the war of 1812, an uncle was in the Mexican war, and a two brothers in the Civil war and a nephew in the Spanish-American war.

According to word received from the local land office at The Dalles, township 1 north, range 24 and 25 east in this county have been designated as subject to the provisions of the enlarged homestead act by the Secretary of the Interior. These townships were withdrawn for irrigation purposes August 24, 1904, at which time most of the land had been patented or filed on. By order of May 12, 1910, these townships were restored to entry, but there is very little, if any vacant land left, and the only effect of the designation is that after June 1, 1911, a qualified person can make a 320-acre homestead entry therein if he can find that amount of vacant land.
