### IN CIRCUIT COURT.

Beginning on last Tuesday morning, Judge Phelps held a four days' session of circuit court for Morrow county, and cleaned up business that had been pending for some time. In going over the docket we make note of the following:

Ernest Piper vs First National Bank of Heppner; motion for non-suit for failure of plaintiff to appear or prosecute action; taken on advisement; plaintiff required to pay on or before July 7, to clerk of this court \$50 to cover costs and disbursements and \$64 to cover fees of jurors and stenographer for one day.

Eliza J. McAlister vs Joe Meier and James A. Brown; default against defendant Meier allowed and entered.

Mabel Ayers Hughes vs Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation Co.; demurrer to defendants further and separate answers sustained; 20 days to further plead if so desired.

Paul Keitman, guardian vs F. P. Wilson; 30 days to file answer.

Bruce B. Kelley vs J. M. Hager and S. P. Devin, co-executors; referred to J. S. Beckwith to take and report testimony by consent of all parties.

### Bogus Check Artist.

A fellow giving the name of Walter Conlin, was arrested and brought before Justice Williams on Wednesday morning, charged with the crime of uttering a forged check. He passed a couple of checks in Heppner on Tuesday that proved to be forgeries. One of these was cashed by Frank Fuchs, the baker, and the other was taken up by Harry Duncan at the store of Thomson Bros. When presented for payment, these checks were turned down by the First National Bank, upon whom they were drawn. Fuchs got hold of the check artist and his money was returned, but Duncan did not stand for the game, and swore out a complaint and Conlin was arrested and presented before Justice Williams. He waived examination and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in November under a bond of five hundred dollars, which he was unable to furnish, and will consequently have to be boarded at the county's expense until his case is disposed of in the fall, unless sooner taken up by the Circuit court. The checks were for small amounts.
