Mrs. Mary A. Furlong, a resident of Morrow County since the summer of 1888, died at the home of her son-in-law, Fred Knighten, near Hardman on Wednesday the 7th inst. of a stroke of paralysis.

The funeral was held and interment had at the Hardman cemetery on Friday. Mrs. Furlong was a pioneer settler in Morrow County, and for a number of years resided with her family on their farm at the mouth of McKinney creek, known now as the Nunamaker ranch. She came to this country from the state of Kansas.
