Good roads through Oregon is a subject that will in the future receive a great deal of attention from the Oregon Development League. Besides having a good roads day at the Astoria convention, August 14, 15 and 16, the League will take up highway betterment actively and the offices of Secretary Chapman of the League will be headquarters for the good roads movement.

Through its ramifications throughout the state, the League will learn public sentiment on the subject of good roads and strive to aid the various sections. Secretary Chapman of the League believes the subject touches very closely the welfare of the farmer. He hopes to bring together the various interests so they will work in harmony. First, he will learn the wishes of the people in the matter and do nothing not thoroughly representative of public opinion throughout the state.

The railroads, state agricultural college and the business interests of Portland are united on a plan to aid Morrow, Sherman and Gilliam counties in agricultural advancement. A demonstration train will be operated next Fall through that section and experts from the state college will explain the possibilities of diversified farming and stock raising in order to build up the soil, although there is no intention to do away with wheat as the principal crop. It is believed however, that improved methods will conserve moisture in the soil and by growing other things than the single grain, as at present, two crops can be had in three years instead of two in four years as at present. Seed will be distributed from the train and prizes offered for the best results obtained by farmers.

DEATH OF TOM LEE.

Tom H. Lee, a young farmer of the Lexington country, died at the Heppner Sanatorium on Tuesday morning, following an operation for appendicitis. He was taken very ill with the complaint on Saturday, but was not brought to the hospital until Sunday afternoon, when it was found that he was suffering a very severe attack of appendicitis, and he was immediately operated upon. His case was so serious that the doctors had little hope of saving his life after the operation, and he gradually grew worse, in the face of all efforts that were put forth to save him, and the end came on Tuesday morning.

Mr. Lee had really been sick much of the time all spring, but his trouble did not take a serious turn until Saturday, and his operation revealed that he had gone too long.

Tom H. Lee was a native of Moscow, Idaho, and came to this country in the fall of 1903. He was married in November, 1906, to Miss Mary Remmey, of Lexington, and to them two little girls have been born. He has followed farming since coming to this country, was just past 23 years of age, and a young man well thought of in the Lexington country. Funeral services were held at Lexington last evening, being conducted by Rev. E. P. Warren, of Heppner, and the remains laid to rest in Lexington cemetery.

Richard Wilson of this city has sold his entire herd of Polled Angus cattle to the Whitcomb Co. of Morrow county, Oregon. Besides the Angus cattle they are establishing a herd of Poland China hogs and have about 500 White Wyandotte chickens and a flock of mammoth bronze turkeys. This company also bought Mr. Wilson's standard bred stallion, Ross McGregor and have a mammoth jack, both of which will stand for public service on their Morrow county farm.—Rural Spirit.

WILL BE BIGGER AND BETTER.

Diplomas to Be Presented Exhibitors

The directors of the Third Eastern Oregon District Fair Association have begun actively on a campaign for a "bigger and better" show during fair week this year, which begins on September 11 and they are adopting a number of new plans for arousing interest in the fair and for stimulating the farmers to become exhibitors. One of these plans which has just been announced by Secretary Thomas Fitzgerald is that of presenting diplomas for the best and largest displays of farm products, which diplomas will be in addition to any regular premiums which will be awarded to exhibits or any parts of exhibits.

The following is a list of the exhibits for which parchments will be given:

Best and largest display of farm products grown by exhibitor in the district.

Best and largest display of sheep wheat grown by exhibitor in the district.

Best and largest display of sheep oats grown by exhibitor in the district.

Best and largest display of sheep barley grown by exhibitor in the district.

Best and largest display of canned goods put up by exhibitor in the district (canning factories barred).

Best and largest display of vegetables grown by exhibitor in the district.

Best and largest display of fruit grown by exhibitor in the district.

Water Spouts.

While we had some precipitation in Morrow county last week, and a few sections were hit by slight water spouts, our neighbors in the vicinity of Monument suffered quite extensively. Oscar Schafer is over from his ranch at Monument and reports that it rained very hard in both Deer creek and Cottonwood canyons and that much damage was done to some of the places along these creeks. Hay crops were injured and some orchards were destroyed. J. S. Bueck suffered the loss of 263 head of sheep, and Lawrence Sweet's place was badly torn up. The John Day river was caused to rise about 8 feet from the inflow of its tributaries near Monument and it is reported that myriads of fish were destroyed by the muddy water, the banks of the river being strewn with dead fish as far down as Spray.

Mr. Schafer reports general crop conditions in Grant county as being good, though a portion of his section has suffered some from the hot weather.

It will be some two or three weeks before the work on the flume is done so that the water can be turned in again, and there may be no water unless copious rains should fall. The company hope to have their flume in such shape that they will be able to hold all the water that can be turned in another season and give their patrons better service.
