Governor West has commuted the sentence of Joseph Casaday to life imprisonment. It was expected that he would do this, and by so doing he has dealt out even handed justice.

Colonist rates to Oregon will again be in effect this fall, from September 15 to October 15, on a basis of \$25 from St Paul and the Missouri River to any point in Oregon, or \$33 from Chicago. Railroad traffic officials expect there will be a heavy movement to the Pacific slope this fall, for there is a heavy inquiry already about the rates.

Portland has won the 1912 reunion of the Elks, which means that it will be host to one of the largest gatherings in the country next year. The Portland lodge sent a large delegation to Atlantic City several weeks ago, won a lot of prizes in the parade and topped off the annual gathering for 1912. This is a big event and one that will do much to attract attention to the entire Pacific Northwest.

The Hill interests will spend \$25,000,000 in extensions and betterment to the properties in this state, according to advices received from the East. This sum will be made available for more mileage, aiding in the development of the whole state. The United Railways and The Oregon Electric will be extended and other feeder lines of the North Bank road, the backbone of the Hill system in the Northwest, will be pushed.

The Commercial Club of Vancouver Wash., has the right idea. It will foster closer business relations between the business men of that city and the farmers throughout the county. Frequent visits to each part of the county will be made by the city men and every possible assistance will be given those of the outlying country. Co-operation in building roads and other matters of mutual benefit will be the result of this policy.

There will be three big land shows in the East this fall. New York, Chicago and Omaha are planning to hold exhibits that will let prospective homeseekers know what the entire country has to offer. All transcontinental railways are aiding in these projects, lending them generous financial assistance. The agents of the various shows have been active in the Northwest for some time, lining up the various districts. It is safe to say that Washington and Oregon will be well represented.

Oregon has a climate that is a great asset but this fact is not generally recognized here at home. It was impressed during the past week however, when the national convention of Christian churches was in session here. B. A. Long, millionaire lumberman of Kansas City, who pledged a gift of \$1,000,000 to carry on the work of the church, said the Portland convention was the best in the history of the organization, and was due to the favorable weather which made it comfortable for the delegates at all times, so that the sessions were not fatiguing nor were the speakers tired and dull, as is often the case when the conventions are held in Eastern cities in Midsummer.

Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Morrow Warehouse Milling Company was held at their office in Heppner on Tuesday afternoon. O. E. Farnsworth was re-elected president, J. H. McHaley, vice president, and R. F. Hynd secretary and treasurer. These, with the addition of Frank Gilliam and M. S. Corrigan, were elected directors. Mr. Hynd desiring to retire from the active management of the affairs of the company, Mr. E. D. Brown was appointed to this position and will take up the active duties of his office at once. He has been with the company for the past two years and has become very familiar with the duties to which he is called, having acted largely in that capacity during the absence of Mr. Hynd in the Old Country. Mr. Hynd has been manager of the company for the past fifteen years and now retires to take up his residence in Portland. He will retain his interests in the company, however, and expects his business affairs to call him to this city much of the time during the year. He is a man that has been actively interested in the welfare of Heppner and the surrounding section, and the people of this community regret very much to have him leave. While at this time he has no business interests in the metropolis, he expects later to enter the business life of the city when he has taken time to look around and determine just what line he will engage in. Mr. Brown, the successor of Mr. Hynd as manager of the Morrow Warehouse Milling Company, has been a resident of Morrow county for the past six years, is a man well liked, and we bespeak for him success. As a warehouseman he has had years of experience and is well fitted for the position he assumes. In the milling department, the directors have retained Mr. Frank Stevenson, who has been in charge of this part of the business for the past number of years, and who as a miller does not need to take a back seat for any of them. His end of the business will be kept up to the top notch, and in the future an A No. 1 article of manufacture will be turned out from this mill, as has been the case in the past. Mr. Stevenson is now taking advantage of the closed season and is thoroughly cleaning up and renovating the mill for the seasons grinding, and by the time the new wheat begins to come in he will be ready for it with the mill in ship shape from top to bottom.
