THE NEWSPAPER AND THE HOME MERCHANT.

An Ohio newspaper recently lamented in its editorial columns on the tendency of many citizens in its territory to purchase goods outside of their own town. The publisher said in part:

"All kinds of property rise and fall together with the advance or recession of the business of the place where they are located. If a new habit of spending money at home could come about it would increase the business of the retail stores, more clerks would be employed, and the proprietors and their employees would keep an increased amount of money in circulation."

"The practical result would be that every one who owns any property here would sooner or later get the benefit."

"The real estate owner would find new comes bidding for his property. The retail store would see its sales and profits grow larger. The professional man would have a larger constituency."

"To every property owner, then, every purchase made at home brings some secondary return. Some of the money spent comes around to him again."

"In practice when a property owner buys elsewhere he throws away a rebate check that is his when he buys at home."

That editorial has to do with a subject on which, more than anything else perhaps, depends the success or failure of the country newspaper—home trade. Bread may or may not be the staff of life, but no one can rightly argue that home trade is not the staff of life of the country paper. Build up the local traffic in all kinds of merchandise or products and the community will flourish even as much as the wicked, who have been compared to the green bay tree.

The local merchants can encourage home trade by supplying first class wares. The local physicians and lawyers can merit confidence by giving their best services. But, after all the one agency that can do most toward what has been termed in these columns "boosting the town" is the local newspaper.

The newspaper reaches the masses of people and, as a rule, has and deserves their confidence. They will act on its suggestions and put into effect its recommendations that seek to promote the community's welfare, sometimes described as "the common good."

Therefore if home trade does not average what it should, if citizens patronize mail order houses or do their shopping in neighboring cities, the home papers must be held largely accountable. They have not only the cure for the disease, but they are the cure.

They can demonstrate this truth by displaying the advantages of the town in their columns, by advocating the support of the local dealers, by giving advertisers the best possible service and by convincing home merchants of the benefits of publicity.

Sometimes residents of small towns state that they purchase goods elsewhere because they believe that the local dealers do not have the most up to date articles in stock. In some instances they may prove correct in this belief, but they do not realize that it is largely through

slighting the merchant in the past that has resulted in the inability or indifference on his part in the present. The solution of the problem: Patronize the home dealer, your neighbor, and he will be better and more quickly enabled to expand his business and to increase his stock to meet exacting demands.—American Press.

Secretary of the Interior Fisher will visit Oregon next month, inspecting the reclamation projects under way here. He will learn of conditions prevailing in respect to forest reserves, vacant government lands and the other matters under his control. He will also visit other Pacific Coast sections and Alaska.

Oregon may soon have a silk industry. A colony of Italians will settle in Wasco County next month and the immigrants expect to raise mulberry trees for silk worms. The newcomers are said to be experienced in this industry in their own country and they find on investigation that Oregon is suited to the growth of the industrious worm and the manufacture of its gossamer fiber.

Seattle's former chief of police, C. H. Wapenstein, has been sentenced to serve from three to ten years in the penitentiary, having been convicted of accepting a bribe of \$1,000. His attorneys tried hard to stave off the pronouncement of judgment, but the court refused. In the meantime Wapenstein has a respite, pending an appeal to the Supreme Court for a new trial. There are seven other indictments against him.
