City Council.

City council met in regular monthly session on Tuesday evening, Monday being a legal holiday. Aside from the paying of a few bills, no other matters came up for attention, and there was no discussion of subjects, some of which should be taken up. The repairing of sidewalks and street crossings was touched on in a minor way, and it was noted that proper notices to property owners having defective and worn sidewalks to repair same, had been prepared and served at once. The matter of repairs of the Star Brewery building was also put before the council. The agent of these people recently visited Heppner and states that his company is willing and anxious to put the building in first class shape at once, if they are assured that the council will grant a liquor license and permit a saloon to be opened up in the building. Some of the council seem inclined to do this, holding to the theory that another saloon or two in Heppner can do no more mischief in the dispensing of booze than the five now doing business, and the city would get the benefit of the revenue. Others of the council are opposed to this idea, and as city election is not many months off, they prefer to let the people of the town express themselves in the matter. No action was taken. The following claims against the city were audited and paid: W. P. Scrivner, blacksmithing, \$2.25; Vaughn & Sons, hardware, 75c; J. A. McCraw salary, \$75.00; J. P. Williams salary, \$16.65; H. A. Emerson, salary, \$8.33; H. I. & W. Co., current \$99.60; Wm. Baird labor, \$22.50; Allan McFerrin, labor, \$25.75; Mack Smith, labor, \$3.75.

Council met in short session again last evening and accepted the resignation of Allan McCraw as marshal. No appointment has yet been made, but the impression is abroad that Mack Smith will get the office. In the meantime Wm. Ayers is standing up under the burden of the policeman's badge and striking terror to the hearts of all evil doers.

School Notes.

On Monday, I had the pleasure of visiting the school at Roosevelt, Wash. for a short time. The school is under the direction of Miss Bonnie Moseley. The pupils are a wide awake lot of youngsters. The building is a neat, substantial two-room structure. Only one room is in use now, but the people planned for some growth in population in the near future. The halls are commodious and airy. The school rooms are well arranged. The light comes from the rear. The windows are above the level of the eyes of the pupils when sitting, and extend to the ceiling. There is an abundance of window space, almost the whole of the rear wall is taken up by them. The shades are arranged to roll at the bottom. A fair amount of apparatus and a nice lot of library books are provided. The school yard is enclosed by a substantial fence. The school has one of the largest and finest flags I have seen outside of the cities.

Several districts have inquired about water filters. Some of our merchants will have some of them in stock soon, and those interested can investigate for themselves. The Heppner school will soon be supplied with bubbling fountains. These are the proper thing where running water may be had.

ALCOHOL AND MEMORY.

Influence of Intoxicating Liquor Upon One's Mentality.
Every person who drinks alcohol to excess, says Dr. Alexander Lambert in Success Magazine, will not show every form of mental deterioration that may be produced by excessive indulgence, and the degree of deterioration in intelligence which goes to make up the sum total of mentality varies greatly in different individuals. All who drink alcohol to excess, however, show some diminution in their judgment. Judgment means the power of recalling various memories of perceptions through the senses, which have come in from the outside world, memories of ideas, memories of emotions and all the complicated association of ideas that these bring up, and in the recalling of them weigh each one with the other and judge of the value between them. This also means reasoning and decision for action. This power of reasoning and judging is weakened in the alcoholic, and in any brain long poisoned by alcohol it is an impossibility to exercise it. Memory itself is also weakened. There is excessive forgetfulness of the recent past, and in some cases of advanced alcoholism there is absolute forgetfulness of wide gaps of years; a man may be unable to remember anything from the last five minutes back for twenty years and then remember back to childhood. The memories of childhood are more easily stamped on the brain than are those of adult life, both because it takes less to impress a child and because there is not the complexity of ideas crowding into the brain, nor the complexity of association of ideas to be recorded. Therefore memories of childhood make a deeper impress and last longer, and so the complex memories of the adult are the first to be forgotten in the alcoholic, and those of childhood remain.

Jackal Broth.
There are parts of Morocco, we are told by a French visitor, where jackal broth is highly esteemed as a table delicacy. A friendly sheldiscented vehemently when it was intimated that as jackals fed on carrion the broth must have a horrible flavor. "It is only a question of knowing how to prepare it," he said. "You put the jackal, skin and all, for two hours into a vessel of boiling water, then transfer it to another vessel. This process is repeated three times. After ten hours' boiling in five different waters, the carrion flavor disappears and the broth is delicious."--London Chronicle.

Burglarious Crabs.
