The Portland Journal has made rapid progress as a great daily, and is now going to have a new eleven-story steel frame fireproof building to cost above \$900,000. Its architecture is to be of handsome design, surmounted by a clock and chime tower, and there will be 128 rooms for other offices. It is to be located at the southeast corner of Seventh and Yamhill streets.

The Heppner creamery proposition is not dead as many may suppose. It simply slumbereth, and shall be awakened ere long. Cards were mailed some time ago by a committee appointed for the purpose, and quite a number of replies have been received. If you received a card and have not made your reply, do so now. An estimate of the number of dairy cattle that can be handled is what is wanted. Send along your reply.

Acting upon the suggestion of President Taft, made during his recent visit to Salem, Gov. West has written the President outlining the urgent need of making the west end extension of the Umatilla irrigation project. The President promised to give the subject his personal attention if the governor would write him concerning it.

The governor in his letter calls attention to this promise and outlines the benefits to be conferred on Eastern Oregon by the project. The plan involves the reclamation of 69,000 acres of land by the diversion of the waters of the Umatilla river and Willow creek. The reclamation service has investigated the subject and is believed to have made a favorable recommendation although nothing has been officially given out.

The surveys are complete, the water rights existing have been settled, and it appears that an executive order is all that remains to put the work under way. Governor West calls attention to injustice to Oregon in that this state has contributed more to the reclamation fund in proportion than any other state, and has received less.

The officials of the Umatilla Forest have prepared statistics covering forest fires on the local Forest for the season just closed. It should be a matter of local interest to know that during the entire season the

total area burned over was only about fifty-two acres, approximately one one-hundredth of one per cent of the total Forest area.

In all, twenty-one fires were discovered on the Forest. Nineteen of these were extinguished with little difficulty and did practically no damage. The average burn was but 2.41 acres. The largest single burn was near Mallory Creek in Morrow county and it burned over approximately 32 acres.

Very few fires originating from camp fires were discovered and this is a source of satisfaction to those in charge of the Forest as it indicates that campers and travelers within the Forest have taken the necessary precautions to prevent the spread of these fires.

The co-operation and assistance of local ranchers and stockmen and the users of the Forest and their employees is appreciated by the Forest officers.

Look a Little Out.
