The Demonstration Train

The visit of the demonstration train to Morrow County on Monday was the occasion of drawing a large number of farmers and others interested to Ione in the forenoon and to Heppner in the afternoon. The train is jointly operated by the O. W. R. & N. Co. and the Oregon Agricultural College, and is specializing on field pea culture, milo maize and hog raising. A general and liberal distribution of seeds of these two forage plants is being made, and their advantages set forth by the specialists accompanying the train. Several different breeds of hogs are carried on the train, among them being Chester Whites, Poland Chinas, Duroc Jerseys and Berkshires, and the good points of each were pointed out by an expert. Some good points were also gathered by those interested in the dairy industry and a few demonstrations made of chicken raising.

Dry farming methods were presented and quite freely discussed, but there was no lengthy lecturing along any line, the knowledge being imparted by the method of questions and answers.

Dr. Withycombe gave a lively talk on the stock industry for this section, and encouraged dairying for the people from Lexington down; and he further expressed his appreciation of the interest in the efforts put forth by the college and the railroad company in promoting the demonstration train and bringing the people in touch with what is being done to better conditions and establish a more permanent and prosperous Agriculture.

A little incident of the train's visit at Ione was the serving to Dr. Withycombe and associates of a roast pig for their breakfast. J. T. Knappenberg, J. A. Waters and Mat Halvorsen had prepared and nicely roasted for this occasion, nice plump four-week-old pigs, with necessary condiments, and it was served up at the Ione hotel, and greatly appreciated by the visitors.

Ministerial Association.

It is a pleasure to note the fact of the organization of the Heppner Ministerial Association which was effected Monday Morning, Oct. 30. Rev. Crawford of the Christian church was elected president and Rev. Ewing of the M. E. church, secretary. The objects aimed at by this organization are the more satisfactory and united efforts on the part of the churches to meet the problems confronting them in our city and contiguous territory, and it was the sense of the initial meeting that concerted effort should be made to make the work of each pastor more effective and to encourage greater attendance at the services of every church in the city. The meetings of the association will be held on the mornings of the first and third Mondays of each month.
