A GREAT MAN.

Just now Portland is in the midst of a wonderful religious revival under the direction of Gipsy Smith, the English evangelist. Concerning him the Evening Telegram says:

"Every man of real power is a great man in the field in which that power is exercised. Gipsy Smith is a great man because he is a man of real power. Whoever has heard John B. Gough, in his palmist days of tremendously convincing oratory, and now listens to Gipsy Smith, will at once recognize the singular quality of the two. The marvelous intensity and earnestness in each case is the visible evidence of the source of power; but whatever the source, the power is compelling.

"It makes no difference what we may think of emotional religion and all that, the net result of a Gipsy Smith campaign cannot be otherwise than good. The man himself is a spiritual dynamo, and aside from that, in conformity with the history of that which he preaches and with the character of the work he is doing, Gipsy Smith is a miracle. For it is nothing short of miraculous for a man, born of obscurity, and reared in adverse circumstances, to be able to hold the world in thrall. That is just what Gipsy Smith is able to do. If it were so that the world could be and would be gathered into one place where it could sit and listen.

"A man of simplicity, of most undoubted sincerity, of simple words, of fire that flashes the truth at you till you are thoroughly suffused with it, such a man is Gipsy Smith. He is a man of power, whose appearance in any community should help to clarify the spiritual atmosphere."

RESULTS BEGIN TO TELL.

Since the 1st of January, this year, 32,000 dozens of eggs have been shipped from Lane, Morrow County, Oregon, where before there were not enough eggs to supply the home demand. This is one of the direct results of the influence of the demonstration trains in that district. A few years ago that portion of the state was visited by such a train and several members of the agricultural college faculty talked to the farmers on the advisability of raising more poultry and giving more attention to a diversity of agricultural crops. A goodly number of them accepted the advice and they are fully \$8,000 better off in ten months of a single year, allowing that the eggs sold for 25 cents per dozen. It is a very good beginning and before many years poultry products will probably be coming from there by the trainloads.—Salem Statesman.

There is an inclination on the part of some to criticize the work of the Agricultural College in promoting the demonstration train, but this is only one of the benefits that Morrow county is experiencing. The poultry industry will continue to grow and expand here, as will also many other lines of diversified agriculture, thanks to the management of the Agricultural College.

That seaweed of the Pacific Coast will produce \$12,000,000 annually in potash for fertilizer is a discovery recently made by Secy. Wilson of the Department of Agriculture. Here is a chance for Oregon's coast line to contribute an entirely new product to the wealth of the state.

Much of all kinds of weather has prevailed this week—rain, snow and wind—but withal an abundance of moisture is coming down, so we take courage and rejoice, and will be prepared to offer up thanks on the great national Thanksgiving day, but all may not be able to eat turkey this year. It should be quite different a year from now.

A step of state-wide value has just been taken at the Oregon Agricultural College, where a division of extension has been added to the organization, the object being to extend the work of the institution into every section of Oregon. Instruction in farming will be carried into the homes so that people on the farms may carry on such studies as they wish. Farmers' institutes will be extended and the scope of the work of the college will be much enlarged. One of the most important things contemplated by the new work will be a campaign to have agricultural instruction carried on in the rural and city schools of the state.

But little interest is being manifested in the coming city election. There is mayor, four councilmen, recorder and treasurer to be elected. O. E. Farnsworth is mentioned for the mayoralty, while W. B. Barratt, Alex. Cornett and Frank Gilliam are talked of for the council. J. P. Williams and W. A. Richardson will contend for the recorder's office, and L. W. Briggs is announced for the guardianship of the city's strong box. Why not get a few more into the race so that some little excitement and enthusiasm can be aroused. It is needed to stir up the dry bones. By all means let us have more candidates.

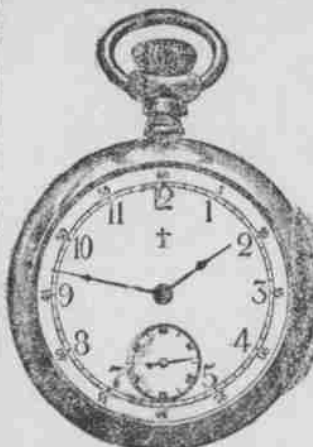
