Please accept thanks for your kind letter of the second concerning the West Extension irrigation project. I agree fully with the views of yourself and the Morrow County Booster Club.

This morning Senators Bourne and Chamberlain, Governor West, J. N. Teal, and myself, appeared before the Secretary of the Interior and urged the building of the West Extension project. We were practically assured that the work upon this project will begin next spring. The Secretary did assure us that if the survey of the lands, which will be received in a few weeks, shows the feasibility of the project (and there seems to be little, if any, doubt on that subject) that construction work will begin in 1912.

"It is time something besides parading and singing 'Onward, Christian Soldiers,' was done by the Christian people," said the Hon.
