According to reports brought in by Henry Ulrich, who resides at Coyote on the Columbia, there is a tremendous flow of ice moving down the river. It is piled up on the rapids and in places the ice is piled back on the shores for a hundred feet or more.

There was a meeting of the Commercial Club on Friday evening at the Club building. The attendance was not large. A report from the financial committee was looked for, and the Club met for the purpose of hearing what had been done. The committee had not been able, however, to get around and see everybody owing to bad weather, and were not on hand to report. Supt.
