## SANDY, OREGON, CENTER OF FINEST AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT, AWAITS RAILROAD

Sandy, Clackamas County, Oregon, has long been known as one of the best trading centers and distributing points of northern Clackamas. For years this thriving village has been known to the farmers of eastern and western Oregon alike, it being on the Barlow road, and the only way to reach Mt. Hood, and across the Cascade Mountains in this portion of the state. No less than six stage and mail lines run too and start from the Sandy postoffice. It is an old saying, and certainly true, that all roads lead to Sandy. It is the natural center of a vast country so full of natural resources as to be a constant cause of wonder to the newcomer.

There are cattle, sheep and goats upon a thousand hills. Cattle is the chief industry of the farmers to the east of the town. Dairying is a large factor in the support of the town as is also the poultry supply, not to speak of its timber in such vast quantities as to be almost limitless. The merchants here have two regular market days for the benefit of their patrons, and in this respect it is the only town of its kind in all the State of Oregon. Monday is the market day of Meinig Bros., and Thursday that of Bornstedt & Sons, the two merchants of the place. Upon those days the farmers from miles around bring in their veal, pork, beef, butter, eggs, vegetables and other farm produce which they either sell to the merchants or place with them upon a commission basis.

Sandy being on the main road of travel to Mt. Hood, Welch's, Salmon, Dover, Firwood, Cherryville, Marmot, Ains, Bull Run and other points of more or less prominence naturally draws a great amount of trade from the places mentioned. In fact one might say that the farmers of the places mentioned give most all their trade to the merchants of Sandy, thereby making of this point the greatest in point of trade of any in this territory.

A great factor in the upbuilding of Sandy will be the new Mt. Hood electric line which is now surveyed to the edge of the town. This railroad will not only bring many thousands of tourists and pleasure-seekers through, and to Sandy, but will also assist in the marketing of its timber. For many miles around Sandy is a vast forest of enormous trees, many of which produce several thousand feet of good lumber to the tree. The railroad will therefore prove a blessing to Sandy, and make of it the greatest lumber, shingle, and wood center within the Cascade range. The village has already felt the stimulus of the railroad movement, Dr. J. G. McElroy being the first to take advantage of the opportunity offered, he having bought the fine cottage recently occupied by Mr. George Bornstedt, from Casper Junker, taking possession last week. The Doctor expects Mrs. McElroy and children from Portland this week. While Doctor McElroy has been in Sandy but a few months he finds himself gradually acquiring a splendid practice.

The business houses represented in Sandy are Meinig Bros., the oldest establishment in this portion of the country, Bornstedt & Son, who recently bought out C. L. Ilden an, and are now busy building up a fine business. J. B. Tawney, the blacksmith, is also a dealer in implements and vehicles of all kinds, and is doing a thriving business. Newton Orr, the stageman, is one of the most progressive men in the village, having built up a very satisfactory business where there was practically none before. Mr. Charles Lewis, of the Sandy Hotel is one of the latest acquisitions to Sandy's business force, but if good judgment and pleasing personality count for anything Mr. Lewis will make of the Sandy Hotel the best known hostelry in the country. Another business man who has seen Sandy grow from nothing to something is Casper Junker. In fact, Mr. Junker may be said to have been one of the main factors in the growth of the town, he having settled here in 1883. He is at present catering to the thirsty traveler, and owns the only saloon in town.
