HARVEST FESTIVAL IN PLEASANT VALLEY GRANGE.

no state enjoying greater prosperity than Oregon".

Deputy State Master F. M. Gill told of the prosperous condition of the grange in Columbia and other counties he had visited. Mrs. Mark Kronenberg again pleased the audience with another piano solo, after which Hon. B. Lee Paget, of Portland, told in a humorous way what he knew about the Snashall family, closing with well chosen remarks concerning the growth of the order. More music by Mrs. Kronenberg and then Mrs. Clara H. Waldo was introduced. True eloquence is that overflow in words which comes from the lips when the heart is burning with zeal and earnestness. With this definition in mind, we do not hesitate to say that Mrs. Waldo is an eloquent speaker. When she takes her position on the floor one sees a middle aged woman of pleasing features and form, graceful pose and a face that mirrors a noble purpose. As she talks she fades into the background and paints a beautiful landscape of agriculture, the dimensions of which completely hides her from our eyes. Mrs. Waldo held the audience as in a trance for a goodly time: in re-peating her remarks with well told stories, explaining in a very able way what the Patron of Husbandry stands for, its hopes, its purposes, its helpfulness, etc. u-ting her hearers to "think good things", to "believe in the dignity and beauty of agriculture", to "bring e-ach a-e and cultivate high ideals, she also suggested that "the grange has reduced freight rates in Oregon an-elsewhere, reduced the cost of wagons, introduced and carried thru a state and national legislatures more helpful laws to the farmer than any other body in the world.
