A number of boys from here attended the social at Pleasant View schoolhouse Saturday night.

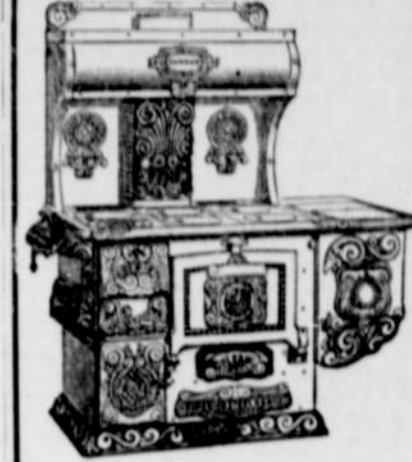
