WORK OF NATIONAL GRANGE.

The National Grange. Patrons of Husbandry, was rapped to order Wednesday, November 14, in Denver, Colo., by Master N. J. Bacheelder. The Grange was opened in the sixth degree.

The treasurer reported the net assets of the order as \$95,000. Mrs. Orla Buxton, of Oregon, was placed on the following committees: Order of business, good of the order and constitution and by-laws. The State Master, Austin T. Buxton, is on the following committees: Foreign relations and publications.

N. J. Bacheelder gave his annual address advocating a \$50,000,000 appropriation by Congress for improvement of roads to be expended at the rate of \$10,000,000 a year for five years. The parcels post and a national mutual Grange life insurance. He said in part:

"Considering the great importance of inaugurating a policy of national improvement of our highways at the earliest possible date, I recommend that the Grange, in addition to reaffirming its position in support of this measure, conduct a special campaign to secure the prompt passage of a satisfactory bill. And, furthermore, as much valuable time has been lost through the failure of Congress to act, I also recommend that a new Grange bill be prepared and submitted to Congress, increasing the total appropriation called for to \$50,000,000, to be divided into five annual appropriations of \$10,000,000 each, to be expended in co-operation with states for improvement of main highways."

He then spoke of the denatured alcohol law, which was secured largely through the efforts of the Grange. Continuing he said:

Advocates Parcels Post. "The evidence submitted to Congress during the past year has been amply sufficient to convince every member of that body that the farmers of the entire country are a unit in their desire for the early establishment of the parcels post."

A. T. Buxton introduced a resolution favoring postal reform. C. B. Kegley, of Washington, introduced a resolution favoring the initiative and referendum and imperative mandate. The National Grange referred this resolution to the State Granges. T. C. Atkeson, of West Virginia, Overseer of the Native Grange, introduced a resolution favoring Roosevelt's ideas on income and inheritance tax.
