HINTS FOR THE SHEEP BREEDER

Every farm should have a flock of sheep. The number kept should depend somewhat upon the size and makeup of the farm. There is always enough forage on a farm that can be utilized to good advantage, if it is taken care of in time, to keep a small flock at least through the winter. Take a flock of breeding ewes, and there is no stock on the farm that will pay any better, writes a New York breeder in American Agriculturist. They should be kept through the winter in a good, thriving condition, not too fat. They can be kept in this condition by judicious feeding of corn fodder or bean pods or clover hay. A change of feed is desirable. A little wheat bran and oats make a fine, healthy grain ration. A yard or field to run in during suitable weather will keep them in the best of condition. They are sure to bring fine, thrifty lambs.

They should have a good shelter at night and away from storms. Sheep should be kept dry, especially in winter. As the season draws near to the lambing time they need watching carefully to see that their udders are not caked or sore. If the ewe is in good condition, there is usually very little trouble about the lamb starting all right. As soon as possible, when the weather will admit, I like to shear the ewes. They will do better, and their udders are not so liable to get sore. The lambs will also do better. Of course the best where they are kept should be closed, so the flock is kept fairly warm. The ewes need stronger feed as the lambs begin to grow.

It will not be long before the lambs will begin to want to eat, and a place should be provided for them to run into where a little wheat bran can be had, also a little clover hay. These should be put in fresh every day. It is astonishing how soon they will begin to eat them and soon begin to show the good effects. Everything about the feed troughs and racks should be kept clean. There is no animal so particular as a sheep about its feed and drink. They should have clean water where they can get it any time.

As nearly all the sheep kept now are of the mutton breeds, I do not believe in crossing the breeds. I use only thoroughbred rams upon my ewes. To

LEAGUE ELECTS OFFICERS.

Declares in Favor of Pushing Street Improvements.

The Improvement League held a very enthusiastic meeting last Monday evening and transacted considerable important business. President Burden, on the behalf of the committee appointed to meet with the library committee of the Home Training association, reported that no general meeting had been held, but that rooms had secured at a monthly rental of \$10 for temporary quarters. Secretary Carter reported that a meeting of the various committees on East side theatre had been called for Wednesday evening, at the club rooms of the East side business men's club on the top floor of the Hotel Sargent. An invitation was extended to all presidents and secretaries of East Side push clubs to be present. W. C. Aylsworth of the library committee spoke on that subject.

The question of the proposed remonstrance against the improvement of Hibbard street was taken up and considerable attention given it. President Burden, H. E. Happersett, H. B. Dickinson and others, property owners on the street, spoke strongly in favor of pushing the improvement. On motion of H. B. Dickinson, seconded by H. E. Happersett, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this league that we greatly appreciate the prompt action of the city council and engineer's office in the matter of the improvement of Hibbard street, and that we approve of the kind of improvement adopted by them, and we respectfully urge that the same be completed as soon as practicable.

The league voiced its sentiment in favor of giving the pound master every assistance in keeping stock off the streets.

The following officers were elected to serve for the ensuing year: H. B. Dickinson, president; W. J. Burden, vice-president; O. E. Carter, secretary-treasurer. The election of an execution committee was deferred until next meeting, to allow a change in the constitution in reference to the same to be made.

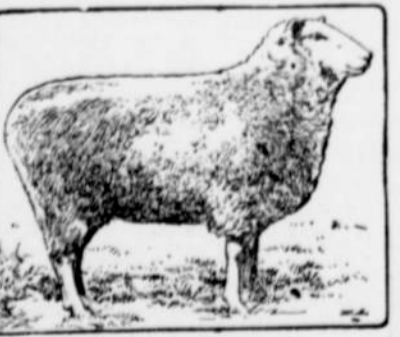

A Fine Leicester.
 The Leicester ewe shown in the illustration is owned by A. F. White of Steuben county, N. Y. Mr. White says of this breed: "Our Leicesters are considered among the best. They are excellent for mutton and have fine fleeces. They cannot be called hardy, since



they require considerable shelter, but they mature rapidly and at twelve months old, when well fed, will dress 100 pounds. Care, however, should be taken that they do not lay on fat too rapidly."

Treating Foot Rot.
 Foot rot must be attacked by the shepherd in the most determined manner if he ever hopes to cope with the disease successfully. The most important part in the treatment of this scourge is the getting at the seat or foundation of same with the knife and caustics. Every loose or detached piece of hoof should be cut away and any of the caustic preparations applied.
