Rev. Father Braseau Reported Better

The Reverend Father L. A. Braseau, who has been ill at St. Vincent's hospital for some time is reported much better.

Father Braseau has had charge of this parish for the past fifteen years and has done a noble work, having established the monastery and catholic schools at this place. Under his able management the work here has progressed very rapidly, and stands as a credit to his name.

The Sisters of the Most Precious Blood, who are in charge of the school, have about forty scholars in attendance, all of whom are making very satisfactory progress.

Grace Baptist Church Notes.

Pastor Gilman Parker preached the dedicatory sermon at Brownsville, Oregon last Sunday (February 10th) setting apart for divine service the new and beautiful house of worship of the First Baptist church of that city. He was assisted in the services by the Rev. H. Wyse Jones state evangelist. Mr. Jones will continue some weeks in revival effort.

In the absence of the pastor, Rev. A. E. Leonard of St. Johns preached in the morning service and Rev. Thomas J. Elkins of Sellwood in the evening.

The pastor will repeat the dedication sermon next Sunday morning in the church here, and in the evening there will be revival services, and some six or more people to be baptized.

On Thursday evening occurred the annual roll call of the church; the names of 165 members were called, and 98 responded, there being many detained at home on account of sickness. The pastor gave a short talk pointing out some needed repairs to the house of worship, speaking of the need of additional room to accommodate the various departments of work. At the close of this address the church voted unanimously to build on a room in the rear, to cost about \$500. This work to be executed by the Young People's society, in the near future. Money was freely offered to pay for this improvement. In addition to this was voted to spend at least \$100 on the interior of the auditorium.

The pastor entered upon his second year in the pastorate, last Sunday morning (the 3d) preaching in the morning his annual sermon. In the evening at the close of an evangelistic sermon, two men and a woman were converted and have applied for membership in church.

Mrs. W. A. Burdett, who has been suffering from the injuries received in the street car accident at Portland on May 24th of last year, was given a judgment for \$1500 damages from the street car company. Considering the severity of the accident, expense of doctors bills, loss of business, and the extreme mental and nervous shock to her system. The judgment rendered was to say the least pretty small.
