The Largest Class.
 What is the largest class ever initiated into a subordinate grange? We cannot answer definitely, but not in recent years has there been one to exceed that taken into Pembroke grange in New Hampshire in 1886, which numbered 133.

Ogden grange, Monroe county, N. Y., has arranged to have a farmers' institute meeting once a month this winter, with well known speakers on agricultural subjects present to address the members.

Strong subordinate granges should send their lecturers or some other interested workers to the state grange sessions and pay their expenses. It will be a good investment for the grange.
