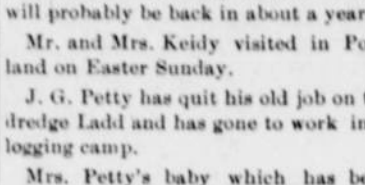
### PLEASANT VIEW

We were indeed glad to welcome Mr. and Mrs. Woodlin back from New Mexico where Mr. Woodlin was engaged in mining.

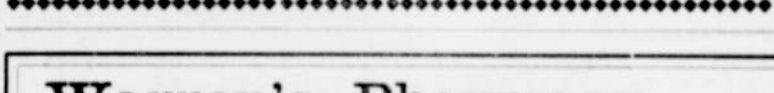
Mrs. Irene Woodlin is in Portland this week caring for her sister-in-law, Mrs. Chas. Ogden, who is very ill.
