State Master Buxton has made the annual announcement of the thirty-fourth session of the Oregon State Grange. It will convene at Hood River, May 28, at 10 o'clock a. m., and will continue four days. The degrees of Flora and Pomona will be given on Thursday evening, and the subordinate degrees will be exemplified by trained teams on Friday evening, at which time the winners of the State Grange contest will be announced and prizes awarded. Memorial services for deceased members will probably be held on Memorial Day.

Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway, the noted equal rights advocate, became a member of Lents grange last week. She will probably be heard from at the state grange.

Several former members of the state grange are delegates again this year. This is something which has not happened for three or four years. Among them may be mentioned, W. H. H. Dufur, A. F. Nutler, W. M. Hilleary, G. E. Thorp and F. M. Kizer, together with their wives. They all understand the business methods of the grange and will give valuable assistance to the new members who comprise the majority of the delegates.

State Master Fuller of New York died a few weeks ago. Last year he refused the nomination of Lieutenant Governor on the republican ticket and would certainly have been elected. He preferred to be master of his state grange as he could not "serve two masters at the same time."

The referendum urged by Linn county against the State University appropriation is meeting with a frost by the granges elsewhere. The Gate Keeper "told you so" several weeks ago. The cause of education should not be hampered, but the matter should come up in the initiative form so as to settle the question once for all.

O. H. Kelley, founder of the grange, now in Washington City has a motto for all grangers. It is: "Don't try to do too many things. If some of the Oregon patrons would remember this and would also try to realize the great harmony that always prevails in the National Grange it would be better for the order and that which is accomplished would be of lasting benefit."

The chairman of all important committees should correspond with the other members and discuss with them the general features of their reports to the state grange; and all who have resolutions of any kind are requested to have them carefully prepared beforehand, in as brief a form as possible, so as to get them in the hands of the committees early in the session.

The alcohol potato, a variety which contains about four times the alcoholic producing capacity of the ordinary variety, was discovered by Prof. Hanson on one of his recent tours of exploration and is to be distributed among a number of experiment stations where it can be grown under conditions which will determine its greatest qualities, manner of cultivation and insure its rapid multiplication. It will be distributed generally and the farmer will be helped in producing his own light, fuel and motive power.

The Clackamas County District Pomona grange met at Logan in the hall of Harding grange No. 122, April 10, master J. W. Thomas, presiding. Harding grange entertained in the splendid manner for which it is noted.

President P. L. Campbell of the State University presented the side of the University in the matter of the referendum. He was accompanied by W. S. U'Ren, who supported him. The discussion of school matters occupied about two hours. Several were present who favored the referendum, but it is the consensus of opinion that the grangers of Clackamas county will make no effort to circulate the petitions.

Resolutions were adopted as follows: To divide the state into sixty representative and thirty senatorial districts, from each of which one representative or one senator shall be elected; to lengthen the duration of grange fire insurance from three to five years; to use the initiative and referendum in amending the constitution and by-laws of the Oregon State grange and to enact a corporation tax law similar to the one now operative in Wisconsin.

F. M. Gill of Garfield grange introduced a resolution stating the grange does not favor the referendum on the University of Oregon appropriation and asking that the much mooted school question be made the subject of an initiative measure. The resolution was frowned upon by the committee on resolutions and laid upon the table without discussion. The tabling of this resolution did not mean that the grange was unfriendly to the university, but that it did not wish to go on record either way.

A class of twenty-four were initiated in the fifth degree. The finance committee found \$97.87 in cash in the treasury.
