BOARD WILL NOT GIVE UP

A New Manufacturing Plant in Prospect for Montavilla.

The Montavilla Improvement Board held its regular session last Monday evening. E. L. Barnes, representing a wood working plant, was present and asked the assistance of the board in securing a site. He expressed himself as well pleased with the local situation and stated that the question of procuring a suitable site at a reasonable figure was all that stood in the way of locating his plant in the villa. The plant would represent an outlay of over \$10,000 to start with and would give employment to eight or ten men and the force would be increased as the business built up. Messrs. Burden, Hyle and Deveny were appointed a committee to take the matter up and ascertain what steps would be necessary to secure the industry.

The committee on widening of Villa avenue reported that in spite of the favorable showing made before the street committee of the city council at a former meeting, that committee had, at a meeting held last Friday, turned down the 80-foot proposition and endorsed a resolution calling for a 60-foot from Twelfth street to the eastern city boundary. This decision was arrived at at a "star chamber" session, of which no notice had been given to the friends of the 80-foot street, and at which none of them were present. The opinion of those who have followed the matter closely seemed to be that the objectors had been ably assisted by representatives of large property interests in the southern section, whose motives were ulterior and not altogether from sympathy for the "small home owner." Be that as it may, the Board did not evince any disposition to submit tamely to the decision, and a motion was made and carried that a resolution be presented at the next council meeting asking that Villa avenue be made 80 feet wide from the eastern city boundary to West avenue, or if the property interests represented were agreeable, to Division street. This would eliminate practically all the objectors. As it was thought that a petition asking for the same would be signed by at least nine-tenths of the property owners affected. While this would, of course, not be far-reaching in benefits as if it were continued westward it would at least relieve the situation as far as Montavilla is concerned. The Board will continue its fight for what it believes is for the best interests of all concerned, until absolutely knocked out.

A Burglary
