NEW ELECTRIC RAILWAY COMPANY
 Stockholders of Mt. Hood Railway and Power Company Interested.
 Promoters of the Mt. Hood Railway & Power company yesterday filed articles of incorporation with County Clerk Fields for the Portland Eastern Railway company. The new corporation has a capital stock of \$5,000,000, and it is announced will not effect any changes in the company. The object of the new corporation, as expressed in the articles of incorporation filed yesterday, is to build an electric railway line from Portland to Mount Hood. The incorporators are, E. P. Clark and Arthur H. Flemming of Los Angeles; Elmer B. Collwell, Robert T. Linney and C. W. Miller of Portland.
 Mr. Clark, who is president of the Los Angeles and Pacific and was also one of the principal organizers of the Mount Hood Railway and Power company, is expected to reach Portland within a few days, when the plans and purposes of the new company will be announced.—Oregonian.
