## HOW GRESHAM WILL CELEBRATE THE DAY

The various committees of the Gresham fourth of July movement met in the Town Hall last Monday night, submitted their different reports and consulted as a whole as to future operations.

The building and decorating of the liberty car was left to the members of that body also the securing of the relief corps, fire and drum corps, etc., with the assurance that the old soldiers and their assistants would be on hand and at the head of the column on the morning of the Fourth.

### THE ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING, DIST. NO. 4

Big Majority in Favor of the Eastern Multnomah Union High School.

Last Monday afternoon found a goodly number of citizens at the annual school meeting held in the school building at Gresham. O. I. Neal was elected to succeed himself as director for the ensuing three years, and H. L. St. Clair re-elected clerk for one year.

Prof. James Preston of Berkeley, California was present and at the request of Chairman Neal and others, told of the success of union high school work in California. Following the remarks of Mr. Preston a vote was taken on this district uniting with districts 8, 10 and 26, resulting with 51 votes in favor of and five against, the movement. After the above vote had been cast, remarks were made by Timothy Brownhill, Theodore Brugger, Charles Cleveland, Dr. J. M. Short, J. J. Robertson, Dr. A. Thompson, A. Cornutt, Rev. David Cathey, H. L. St. Clair, Lewis Shattuck and others, as to the advisability of continuing and improving the work of the Gresham high school if the union high school movement failed.

An expression was called for and resulted unanimously in favor of a forward movement along higher educational lines in Gresham school district.

The clerk's report showed 248 children of school age in the district, school property worth about \$7500.00 and everything pertaining to school matters in a very satisfactory way.

## HOW "OLD GLORY." IS PUT INTO SHAPE

The Most Expensive Flags Are Made of Bunting and Sewed by Hand.

It is not generally known that flags of the common and cheaper variety are printed on a press similar to that used for newspapers, yet such is the fact. At present a new plate and hence a new impression are required for each color. Thus for our red, white and blue banners, which blossom all over the land each Fourth of July, two plates and two impressions are needed, one for the red and one for the blue. The white is furnished by the original color of the muslin or other goods on which the flags are printed. It is hoped in time that one plate may be made to do the work when the expense will be lessened and the facility of production increased. It must not be imagined that two runnings through the press are required. Just as four or more colors are printed on newspapers at one running through the press so the two colors are supplied to the national emblem in the same way. This effect is reached by the use of two sets of rollers and plates, the goods passing from one to the other.

It is said that the largest flag factory in America, and for that matter in the world, is located in Cincinnati. Here are manufactured a large share of the flags used in the United States and some even for England. There are 125 people engaged in the factory, and ten wholesale establishments handle the output. This factory was made possible by the invention of the flag press before mentioned, which was the work of a Cincinnati man.
