ROUSING MEETING HELD BY DIRECTORS OF FAIR

Baby Show to be an Interesting Feature—Industrial Work for Boys and Girls.

That the Multnomah County and Grange Fair and Carnival, to be held October 15 to 19, lasting four days, will be a grand success was demonstrated by the number of directors and committee-men present and the interest shown in last Monday's meeting, which began at 10:30 and lasted till 5:30. That a monstrous undertaking is before Gresham people in making this fair a success is fully realized by all concerned and that the leaders will be obliged to devote much valuable time, thought and labor to the preparations and carrying through of this great undertaking, has not disconcerted them in the least and each one is putting his shoulder to the wheel and his brains to work in a most energetic manner. Gresham city officials and business men are taking the deepest interest in the matter. During the Monday session a committee was sent to bring into the meeting the city officials, but the committee met them at the entrance to the grange hall.

They had heard of the meeting and came to lend their assistance, as Mayor Dr. J. M. Short said: "We are ready to spend time and money to help on this good cause. We expect to devote at least \$1,000 to erecting suitable buildings for exhibits and necessary improvements on the grounds."

The grounds offered by Dr. A. Thompson, the grange and the churches, being situated at the rear of the grange hall, has been accepted and is considered a very desirable location in easy access to the depot. Charles Cleveland has chosen the east side of the grounds next to the street leading to the depot as the place for the livestock exhibit, because of the close proximity to the depot, making it handy to bring stock into the grounds which is shipped, and because of the water supply at this point.

Dr. Louis Dechmann, in making his report as chairman of the horticultural committee said: "If we succeed in doing half what we are undertaking we will have a fair to be proud of."

Dr. Dechmann, with the assistance of E. P. Smith, is preparing to have a fine exhibit, which will cover a large space of ground at the south end of the

Women Climbers Again View Falls

On Wednesday, Aug. 28, a party of six, including Ed. Roberts and wife of Vancouver, Wash., Effie Roberts and Marie Dinger of Gresham, Ralph Fox and Conrad J. Sieberts of Portland, left Welches camp and walked to the surveyors' cabin, a distance of ten miles in three and one-half hours.

After eating a lunch they proceeded on their trip to the big falls of Salmon river, a distance of about two miles of perilous ascending and descending over huge boulders and logs and around cliffs, where a foot slip might land one into deep water. At places the cliffs and river bed are lava rock. One travels closely on one side of the stream then fords the river, which is swift enough to nearly make you lose your footing. Then comes the most perilous part of the trip, an ascent of 200 feet up an almost perpendicular cliff of lava rock and an uprooted tree down its side, with no ropes to aid and only a stick or two wedged between the log and cliff to aid in the ascent made one's heart palpitate with fear and his knees to tremble, but looking upward saying, "I will," we reached the top, where we again journeyed on, viewing the grand scenery of beautiful cliffs and beautiful stream until we reached the foot of the magnificent falls. Here they make the plunge of fifty feet or more and send up a spray that has all the colors of the

GRESHAM SCHOOLS OPEN SEPT. 16TH

Excellent Corps of Teachers Elected—Another Large Room Provided.

The Gresham public and high school will open for another year Monday, Sept. 16. The corps of teachers has been completed and consists of the following well trained instructors: Prof. C. C. Baker, principal and high school teacher, Miss Catherine Cox, graduate of California state university at Berkeley, Cal., assistant high school teacher; Miss Jessie Beard, seventh and eighth grades; Miss Hattie Pierce, fifth and sixth grades; Miss Grace McKenzie, third and fourth grades; Miss Lula Parmely, first and second grades.

A new course of study has been outlined for the high school, the same having been made necessary by the adoption by the state Board of Education of a new series of text books. The new course is as follows:

First year, English 1, Algebra 1, General History 1, Bookkeeping 1.

Second year, English 1, Algebra 1, Geometry 1, Physiology 1, Botany 1, General history 1.

Third year, English 1, Geometry 1, Physics 1, Latin 1.

Fourth year, English 1, United States History 1, Economics 1, Chemistry, Caesar 1.

It will be noticed that bookkeeping is required in the first year; economics is introduced, being required in the fourth year; three specified subjects are required for each of the four years, thus leaving but one option; and it is provided that no pupil shall carry more than four subjects at any one time.

The course of study, as it now stands, is admirably adapted to the conditions of the times, to a scientific and practical age. Science is given first place. English and history are made prominent, while such practical subjects as bookkeeping and economics are introduced. A knowledge of the modern system of bookkeeping and office methods is a guarantee to a young person of "bread and butter," and it is now conceded political economy is one of the essentials to any system of education having for its purpose the equipment of young people for the practical affairs of everyday life.

A new room has been added for the use of the high school classes. It is 18 x 20 feet in size, is plastered, has plenty of blackboard space and is seated with university chairs. In the basement is a well lighted room, fitted and furnished for a chemical laboratory. Having running water, it is admirably adapted for this purpose. The board is making several other improvements, which will add materially to the school's equipment and capacity.

Fair Executive Committee Elected

The members of the Gresham Commercial and Development league held an enthusiastic meeting at the town hall last night. At this meeting plans were perfected for the housing of exhibits and stock at the Multnomah County and Grange Fair and Carnival, to be held in Gresham, Oct. 15-19. An executive committee, composed of Mayor J. M. Short, Lewis Shattuck, B. W. Emery, R. R. Carlson and Theodore Bronger, was elected, whose duty it will be to appoint five sub-committees, of which one member of the executive committee will act as chairman.

Prospects for the fair are growing brighter every day, and it promises to be larger and better than expected when the movement was started.
