President of Oregon Historical Society Gives Write-up—Williams' Prophecy.

PORTLAND, Sept. 2, 1907.—Editor Beaver State Herald: Inasmuch as great interest is being taken in the proposed Multnomah County and Grange Fair and Carnival, to be held at Gresham on Oct. 16-19, 1907, perhaps it will not be amiss to give your many readers an account of the first Multnomah County Agricultural society, and show how it originated, and in so doing, I will give the proceedings of the initial meeting as follows:

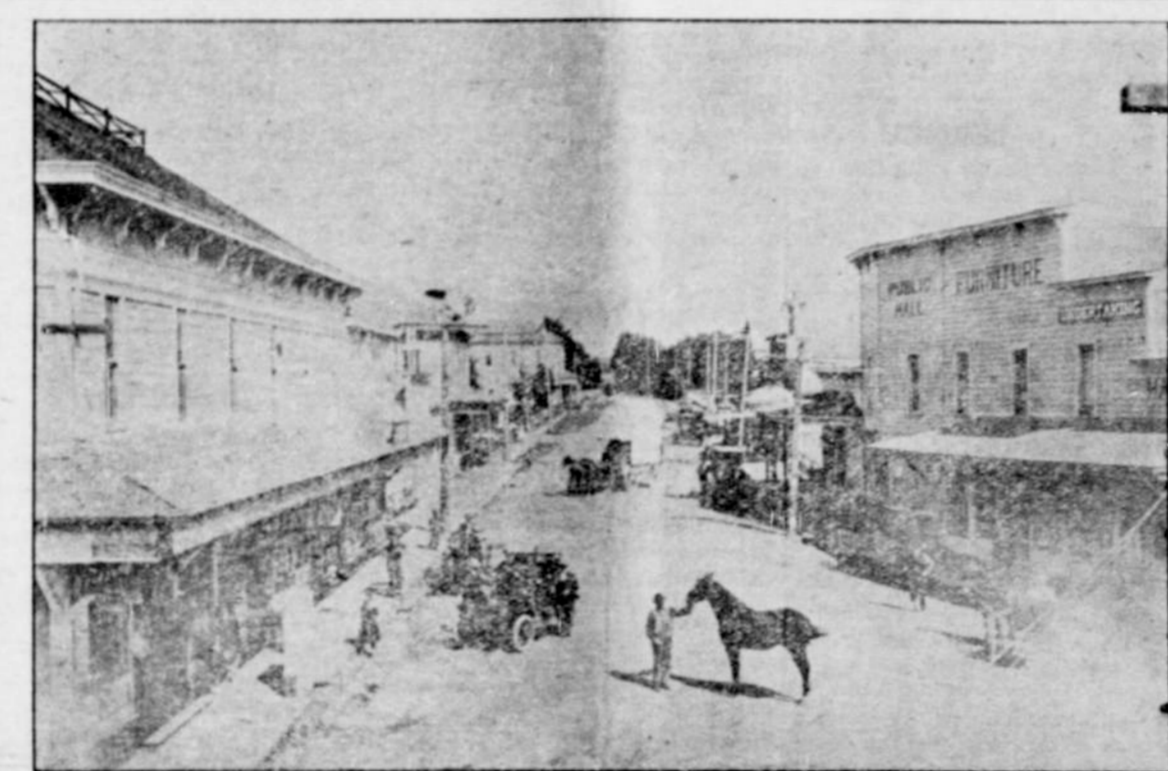
"At a meeting of farmers and others
