At this meeting, by-laws were adopted, and \$3.00 was fixed as the annual membership fee and A. C. Gibbs, James B. Stephens and A. G. Walling were elected delegates to the convention to be held at Salem on Feb. 22, 1860, for the purpose of organizing a State Agricultural society.

At the second semi-annual meeting, held July 7, 1860, an address—the first one delivered before the society—was given by Judge Geo. H. Williams. And permit me to suggest that I hope the management of the fair this year, one delivered before the society-was e displayed in any other, and must given by Judge Geo. H. Williams. A. D. 1907, will invite him to speak again. To my mind such an event, after a lapse of 47 years, would make the occasion one of great interest. 1 H. B. DICKINSON quote the closing paragraph of Judge Williams' address:


