**BIG COUNTY EXHIBIT TO BE BROUGHT HERE**

Grounds Are Nearly Ready for Buildings—Premium List Still Growing.

All preparations for the Multnomah County and Grange Fair and Carnival are progressing as rapidly as possible and in some instances are complete. The grounds are nearly complete and will be ready for the erection of buildings in a few days. Estimates on the amount of lumber have been made by the Business Men's committee and orders will be placed at once for several carloads to be laid down on the yards adjoining the fair grounds before next week. Material in plenty will be secured for all purposes and a contract will be let for the construction of the administration building, the land stand, pavilion and stock pens. Of the latter it is now certain that fully 100 will be needed.

The detail work for all preparations now working by the Business Men's committee has been placed in the hands of F. A. Casswell, an expert in such matters. He is now arranging office quarters on the fair grounds and will push every matter to a finish in his department. He will also work in conjunction with the fair secretary, E. L. Thorp, who is now in Portland every day attending to details that demand his attention there.

The Multnomah county exhibit at Salem, in charge of A. F. Miller, will be brought to Gresham by permission of the county court. There is also available about \$300 in money which the county court will donate to the fair, and which will be used in payment of premiums.

The different superintendents of divisions all report remarkable success in securing exhibits and donations of articles for premiums. Among the latter may be mentioned a contribution of \$100 from Richard Wilson; a Jersey bull, valued at \$100; a sewing machine from Jones' Cash Store; two sets of Haviland china from Prael, Hegele & Co.; cash donations from Allen & Lewis and Wadhams & Kerr for best bread; jewelry and paintings from The Iowa Jeweler and Sautborn & Vail; and probably a hundred or more useful, but lesser articles from many other business houses of Portland. These donated articles will be worth fully \$1000 and will all be displayed at the fair with donors' names attached and will be given away as premiums for best exhibits.

The contest for queen of the carnival is booming and will bring in a big sum, much of which will be spent in robing the queen and her maids of honor.

There is now no doubt of the fair being a big success.

**METHODIST PASTORS IN ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

Bishop Moore Will Preach Sunday Morning in Marquam Grand, Portland.

There will be no preaching in the Methodist church in Gresham on Sunday next, in fact the church is pastorless. But so is every Methodist church in the Oregon Conference. By Monday or Tuesday, however, everyone will be provided again with a pastor, and the gospel chariot will roll on.

The Oregon Annual Conference, now in session in Grace Methodist church, Portland, is composed of ordained ministers, presided over by a bishop, and embraces the territory of Western Oregon from the Columbia to the California line. The presiding bishop this year happens to be the resident bishop, Rev. David H. Moore, whose home is in Portland. He will preach the conference sermon Sunday morning in Marquam Grand.

and interesting, notwithstanding much of routine business, hearing of reports etc. It is a time of enthusiasm when the pastors tell of the triumphs they have won during a year of earnest toil.

The present session is important in that the delegates will be elected to the general conference, meeting next May. There will be three delegates from the ministers, and three lay delegates. These latter are chosen by a lay Friday conference, which meets on Friday (today) in Taylor street church. Thus it is that the general conference, meeting once every four years, is composed equally of ministers and layman.

It is expected that on Monday the appointment will be made. So far as known, there will be no change in pastors in this vicinity.

**EAST MULTNOMAH TAKES THE CAKE**

The County Exhibit at State Fair Wins Many Firsts and Seconds.

East Multnomah's general farm exhibit at the state fair indicated very strongly that this county is second to none in the production of farm produce of vast variety. Fruits, grains, grasses, vegetables of every description were on exhibit. But where east Multnomah made herself famous was in the number of prizes she carried away for livestock. First was the three-year-old Jersey cow, owned by Charles Cleveland, that produced more butter, considering feed consumed, than any other animal exhibited at the state fair, carrying away the second prize on a record of nearly 2 1/2 lbs. of butter per day.

Second, was the carrying away of all prizes for Shropshire sheep and Black Essex hogs by the pens from Cedar Grove farm, Charles Cleveland, proprietor.

Third, the prizes carried away by George Harvey's three-year old colt, "Gentleman Morgan."

Fourth, every prize in the Poultry department worth taking was carried away by Orpingtons, Rhode Island Reds and White Rocks of the Windle Bros. Poultry Farms.

Fifth, the winning of all prizes by the Sun Dial ranch Belgian draft mares and stallions and Imported Spanish Jacks. If you beat east Multnomah you will have to hustle.
