The buildings are up, the grounds cleared and ready for the spread of the great tents and canvas covers that will give to the ten acres of ground on Johnson creek the appearance of an up-to-date carnival city. The event will be one long to be remembered. From the first day, Wednesday, Oct. 16, to its close, a great a-hoing will enjoy for the first time in East Multnomah county, a continuous round of pleasurable entertainment and fun.

The exhibits will be "best by every test." The stock show will surpass anything of its kind ever exhibited at a county fair in the state. The agricultural exhibits will be worth going miles to see. The same may be said of the poultry, music, fine arts, needle work, etc.
