The meeting of citizens in the Reading room Monday evening made up in enthusiasm what it lacked in numbers. Mrs. J. D. Sullivan, president of the Home Training association, presided in her capable manner, and reviewed the steps taken in establishing the reading room from the time books were placed in Mrs. McMillan's store a year and a half ago, up to the opening of the public reading room and library station in February 1907.
