## MULTNOMAH COUNTY AND GRANGE FAIR AND CARNIVAL A COMPLETE SUCCESS

Fine Exhibits in Agriculture, Horticulture, Poultry and Live Stock—Eastside Business Men Are Coming.

(From Thursday's Daily.) The stock show at the First Annual Multnomah County and Grange Fair and Carnival is said to be one of the best ever exhibited in the state. Our folks are on hand with the goods and there is no mistake about it. The poultry show is exceptionally good and has more birds on exhibit than is usually found at a half dozen ordinary county fairs. It takes Multnomah to break the record—she is able to do, and has done it.

At the agricultural building is an unusually fine exhibit of Multnomah's products from farm and orchard. Passing between two giant stalks of field corn at the entrance the sight-seer is at once confronting a pyramid of giant potatoes of many kinds and quality. Looking down the length of the building one sees a galaxy of vegetables, fruits and grain, a delight to the eye of the most blasé.

The scheme of arrangement is good, grains are segregated upon the left hand side facing the back, while on the right are vegetables and fruits. The central portion and sides are occupied by farm exhibits. A number of business men also have exhibits.

The horticultural department is a revelation of what can be done in a few weeks. A beautifully laid out grounds in the center of which is an elegant fountain, and the horticultural building gives a fine setting to the thousands of trees and shrubs so nicely arranged. It is a work of art and is in itself worth the price of admission.

The Furrow, as noted yesterday, is replete with high class attractions and must be seen to be appreciated. Don't forget "The Furrow."

The music and art department is full of beautiful paintings, musical instruments, fancy work and other things of interest to women. Don't fail to see it.

Many complimentary remarks are being made concerning the Gresham fair. It is composed of high class musicians, who are giving entire satisfaction.

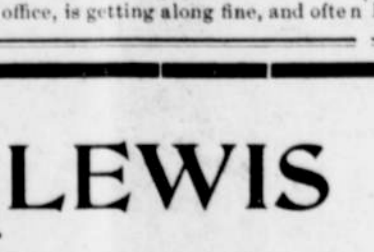

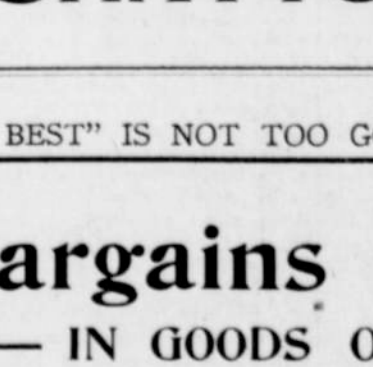
