REPORT BIG STEEL OUTPUT.

Cleveland, O., Nov. 11.—Reports from the building trades reveal some remarkable conditions. Although for a number of weeks new business has been reduced to a small volume, statistics of production for the past month show the seldom in the history of the trade have such large tonnages been turned out. For example, the American Bridge company, the largest producer of structural material, turned out 60,000 tons last month, but sold only one-third of that amount.
