About 6:30 p. m. last Tuesday night a bright light in the sky north of Gresham attracted the attention of the people of this vicinity. Upon investigation it was learned that Thomas Hensley's large barn west of Troutdale had in some unknown manner caught fire and burned to the ground, consuming in its ravage property to the value of \$1200.

The building was a first-class structure of about 30 x 65 feet, situated about 300 feet from the house which was in great danger of being burned for awhile.

Mr. Hensley had barely time to get the frightened stock out of the burning

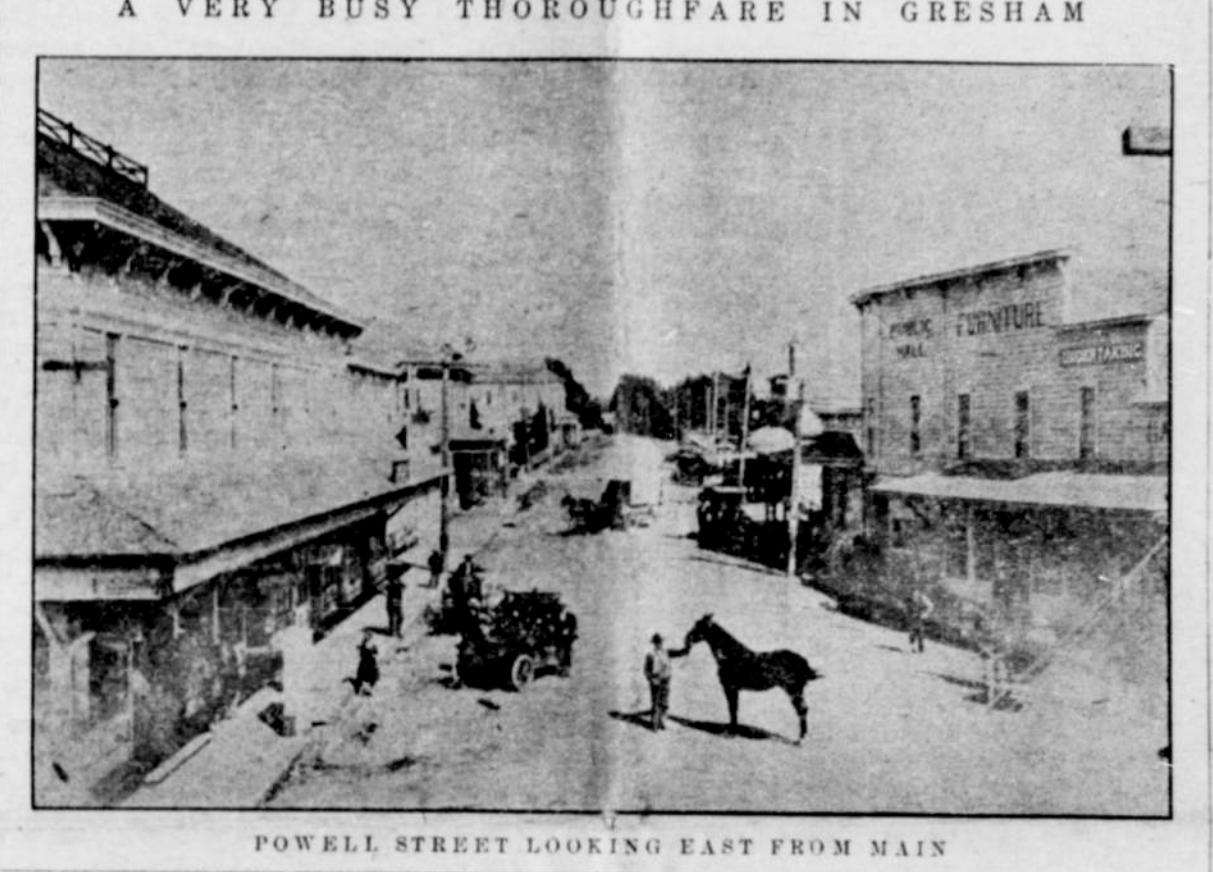
HIGH SCHOOL LITERARY HAS EXCITING ELECTION
